Lanie was the first Relief Society President in Elmo. She was also a faithful Primary and Sunday School worker in both Cleveland the Elmo wards.



In the fall of 1950, Lanie had a stroke which affected her speech. She couldn't put the words together right and had a hard time making us understand what she wanted. It was like learning a foreign language, and the blank look on our faces often times made her laugh.

It was a bitter cold day that January 8, 1955, when the bright twinkle went from her eyes for the last time. The story had ended for the silver-haired petite grandmother everyone loved. She was buried in Cleveland, January 12, 1955
