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## **The Family of Albert Eben Hall and Elzada Ormanda Barney**

### **Albert Eben Hall**

**1868 - 1953**

Albert Eben Hall, also known as Eb, was born December 29, 1868 at Kanosh, Millard County, Utah. He was the youngest of nine children born to Charles Thadius Hall and Elizabeth Caroline Freeman. Albert's brothers and sisters were: Charles, Margaret Ann, John William, Eleanor, Nancy Jane, Columbus Reed, George Smoot, and Caroline. He was raised in Kanosh where he received his formal and religious education.

Albert Eben Hall and Elzada Ormanda Barney were married October 29, 1888 at Kanosh, Millard County, Utah. After they were married, Albert and Elzada lived in several small rural communities throughout Utah including: Kanosh, Millard County; Oasis, Millard County, Ferron, Emery County; Clawson, Emery County; Elberta, Juab County and Orangeville, Emery County. Albert earned a living by working at a variety of jobs including a "section foreman over coal cars on the railroad," but he was primarily a "farmer and rancher."

*The Emery County Progress* stated on July 11, 1908: "Albert Hall and John Fullmer were busy making bricks and putting up two kilns 1½ miles south of town [Clawson] and are going to burn 100,000 or more bricks. Several people are anxious to build homes here."

Albert was an active member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was baptized on September 6, 1897 by Bishop Styler. He was confirmed the same day by A.C. Christensen. Albert was ordained an elder on October 24, 1901 by W.W. Riter. He was ordained a high priest on October 29, 1904 by Rudger Clawson.

*The Emery County Progress* stated on October 29, 1904: "On Tuesday, Apostle Rudger Clawson and the stake presidency stopped at Clawson and held a ward meeting. Wm [William] H. Hitchcock heretofore a presiding elder was promoted to the bishop of the ward and Henry O. Barney was chosen for first counselor and Albert E. Hall for second counselor."

*The Emery County Progress* stated on July 11, 1908: "The Fourth passed off without much excitement. A nice program was enjoyed in the forenoon. In the afternoon a dance for the children. Racing and games of all kinds were indulged in. Albert Hall being the fastest on foot of the bishopric got a nice silk tie.

Albert and Elzada were the parents of 12 children: Clista Ormanda, Clara Ella, Ruby Elzada, Albert Herman, Lois Ermine, Charles Allen, Ora Ann, Barney Cecil and Harold Raymond.

Three children died at an early age: Florence Elnora born November 22, 1895, died December 12, 1895; Elva Ila born December 19, 1900, died January 19, 1909; Joseph Oral was born and died May 9, 1902. Elva Ila's death certificated stated that she died of "Empyema" and "Typhoid was contributory." She was buried in the Clawson Cemetery,

Clawson, Emery County, Utah. It is not known where Florence Elnora and Joseph Oral were buried.

Albert was described as gentle, easy going, and could get along with everyone. As he got older his hair turned white, but remained thick for the rest of his life. Albert and Elzada celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary on October 29, 1938 with a family celebration at the Clawson LDS church.

Elzada died February 18, 1941 at Orangeville, Emery County, Utah. Her death certificate stated she died from "Myocardial failure / Senility progression." Elzada was buried February 21, 1941 in the Orangeville City Cemetery, Orangeville, Emery County Utah. She was 72 years old. The following letter was written by Albert to his son, Barney and family a few months after Elzada died:

Orangeville utah 5-19-41 [May 19, 1941]

*Dear Barney and Iola and Kidys*

i got home last wednesday i was down to Allens nearley 6 weeks. Allen was so crowed with work he couldent get time to work on my Care [car] only a little while each day.

But he finly [finally] got it don [done] and made a good Job of it, i will try and get up ther after decration [Decoration] day.

Could you come down then[,] it comes on friday 30<sup>th</sup>. i heard Harold was moving back to salt Lake i was going to wright to them but Maby they have already moved.

Keney is getting marred the 28 of this month to Ward Cox. they are going to the manti temple.

well they [there] isn't much news to tell you, Earl and ted was here and started back today, ted bought him a second Hand care [car] in salt Lake but it is a nise [nice] one. well i hope you are all well this leaves me feeling Prety good as fare as my Helth is consorned but verry lonesome[.] home is not like it usto [used to] be.

with love to you all

A little over a year after Elzada's death, Albert married a second time. Albert Eben Hall, age 73, of Orangeville, Emery County, Utah and Florence Abby Tucker, age 63, of Clawson, Emery County Utah were married May 11, 1942 at Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, Utah by Charles R. Jones an Elder of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The witnesses were Joseph O. Barney and Merlin J. Topham.

Their marriage license was announced in *The Salt Lake Tribune*, May 12, 1942, Page 18 and *The Deseret News*, May 12, 1942, Page 17:

Albert and Florence were married for nine years. Florence Abby Tucker Hall died April 11, 1951 at Price, Carbon County, Utah. She was buried next to her first husband, Worth Tucker, on April 13, 1951 in the Elysian Gardens Cemetery, Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, Utah.

Albert Eben Hall died December 18, 1953 at Holladay, Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, Utah. His death certificate states he died from "unknown but natural cause." Albert, age 84, was buried December 21, 1953 in the Orangeville City Cemetery, Orangeville, Emery County, Utah. He was buried next to Elzada his wife of 52 years.

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### **Elzada Ormanda Barney (Hall) 1868 – 1937**

Elzada Ormanda Barney was born June 24, 1868 at Kanosh, Millard County, Utah. She was the oldest of nine children born to Joseph Smith Barney and Ormanda Azelia (Rogers) Oviatt. Elzada's brothers and sisters were: Joseph Orson, Henry Orville, Lawrence, Clarence Adelbert, Walter Llewellyn, Florence Eleanor, Arnold Earl and Myrtle Ray. She was raised in Kanosh, where she received her formal and religious education.

Elzada's mother, Ormanda Azelia Rogers was the only child born to Mark Rogers and Sally Ray Whitlock. Her parents were married January 11, 1849 at Council Bluffs, Pottawatomie County, Iowa. Mark died May 11, 1849 in Council Bluffs. Ormanda was born a few months later on October 28, 1849 at Council Bluffs. Sally married Henry Herman Oviatt Sr., on January 2, 1853 in Spring City, Sanpete County, Utah. Ormanda was three years old.

Elzada's father, Joseph Smith Barney, was among the early Mormon pioneers who came to Utah with his parents and other members of his family. The Barney family traveled with the Henry Bryant Manning Jolley Company. There were about 340 people and 64 wagons in the pioneer company. They left from Kanesville (Council Bluffs), Iowa on June 15, 1852 and arrived in Great Salt Lake City, Utah Territory on September 9, 1852. Joseph was six years old when he crossed the plains.

During the early history of Utah, the new settlements had a continual struggle with the Indians. When Joseph was 19 years old, he was living at Circleville, Piute County, Utah. Because of the conflicts, a small military unit was formed in Circleville to protect the early settlers. Joseph became a member of the "Company of Infantry." He enlisted on September 15, 1865 and was discharged on November 1, 1865. Joseph served for 45 days. William Allred was his commanding officer.

Joseph served a second time when he became a member of the "Home Guard." He served from April 1, 1866 until June 28, 1866. William Allred was again captain. While living at Circleville, Joseph delivered mail and rode for the pony express.

After Joseph's military service, he became involved in the "Indian War Veteran's Organization" and often attended reunions. *Deseret Evening News*, January 29, 1906, Page 11:

**ORANGEVILLE  
INDIAN WAR VETERANS  
Hold Annual Reunion – Reminiscences of Early Day Troubles With Redskins.  
Special Correspondence.**

Orangeville, Emery Co., Jan. 23 – The Utah Indian War Veterans association of Emery county held its annual reunion yesterday. There were the usual singing and prayers, with a speech of welcome, and response, speeches, reflections, songs, music, etc., and a good old-fashioned dance in the evening when the hall was crowded. Two sessions were held today both well attended sons and daughters of the "Vets" and the public were invited.

State Commander Westwood of Springville was present, and in his genial way added much to the enjoyment of the occasion.

Many of the comrades related bits of experience and recollection of trials passed through in the Indian troubles. Joseph S. Barney of Ferron related incidents connected with an Indian raid which occurred in the fall of 1865 in Circle valley on the Sevier, at a time when most of the men of the place were away from home, when the 14-year-brother of the narrator and several others were killed by the marauders who also stole a herd of cattle beginning to the settlers.

At the close of the final meeting this afternoon, there was a general handshaking indulged in with many expressions of love and good will.

Elzada Ormanda Barney and Albert Eben Hall were married October 29, 1888 at Kanosh, Millard County, Utah. Albert and Elzada lived in several small, rural communities throughout Utah: Kanosh, Millard County; Oasis, Millard County; Ferron, Emery County; Clawson, Emery County; Elberta, Juab County and Orangeville, Emery County.

Albert earned a living by working at a variety of jobs including a "section foreman over coal cars on the railroad," but he was primarily a "farmer and rancher." Elzada was a homemaker and raised her large family.

Elzada's daughter, Clara Ella Hall Stilson, described her as a woman of many talents. She was a good cook and took pride in her home by making her own curtains and weaving rugs with a loom. Elzada kept her home very clean.

Elzada was an active member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and was baptized on September 6, 1897 by Bishop Styler. She was confirmed the same day by Jacob Hawley. Elzada held many church callings including relief society president and Sunday school teacher. She was president of the Clawson "Young Ladies Association" and her daughter, Ruby, was secretary.

*The Emery County Progress* told on December 18, 1915, "The Clawson Mutual Improvement association was reorganized Tuesday night (the 7<sup>th</sup>) the following officers being sustained for the winter: Russell Williams, president; Chas Prows, first and Victor Barney, second counselors, and Louis Hitchcock, secretary of the Young Men's association and Elzada Hall, president; Mary Barney, first and Mabel Prows, second counselors, and Ruby Hall, secretary of the Young Ladies association.

Albert and Elzada were the parents of 12 children with nine who grew to adulthood: Clista Ormanda, Clara Ella, Ruby Elzada, Albert Herman, Lois Ermine, Charles Allen, Ora Ann, Barney Cecil and Harold Raymond. Three children died at an early age: Florence Elnora, Elva Ila, and Joseph Oral.

Elzada's youngest sister, Myrtle Ray, died October 27, 1905 of typhoid fever. She was 17 years old. Her obituary appeared in *The Emery County Progress* on November 4, 1915, Page 1:

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon over the remains of Miss [Myrtle] Ray Barney the 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Barney. The speakers were Bishop Killpack, ex Bishop Nelson and J.E. King of Ferron and Bishop Hitchcock of Clawson all of whom spoke feelingly of the sad and untimely death of deceased and voiced the sympathy of the people for the bereaved family. A brother, Lawrence Barney, aged about 21 has been critically ill for several day with the dread disease, typhoid fever that caused the death of his sister.

Elzada has been described by her descendants as very moody and sullen at times. When she became mad at someone she would remain mad for a long time. She was a thin woman as she got older. She wore her hair in a bun on the top of her head. Elzada and Albert celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary on October 29, 1938. Pictures of the day show family members enjoying the celebration.

Elzada died February 18, 1941 at Orangeville, Emery County, Utah. She was buried February 21, 1941 in the Orangeville City Cemetery, Orangeville, Emery County, Utah. Elzada was 72 years old and died from "Myocardial failure / Senility progression."

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Albert Eben Hall's parents were Charles Thadius Hall and Elizabeth Caroline Freeman:

She was buried December 30, 1913 in the Snowflake (RV Mike Ramsay Memorial) Cemetery, Snowflake, Navajo County, Arizona.

Elizabeth's death certificate states she was born December 15, 1829 and was 84 years and 13 days old. Her occupation was "Housewife." Elizabeth's father was listed as John Freeman born in Illinois and her mother was Nancy Beel Rowlet born in "America." She had lived in Arizona 30 years and three months and had lived in Snowflake for 15 years. Elizabeth died from "Dropsy and old age." The informant was Iris Flake; Residence, Snowflake, Arizona; Daughter.

Joseph Smith Barney died August 9, 1917 at Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, Utah. He was buried "on arrival" in the Ferron City Cemetery, Ferron, Emery County, Utah. Joseph's death notice appeared in *The Salt Lake Tribune*, August 11, 1917, Page 13:

**BARNEY** – At a local hospital, Aug. 9, 1917, Joseph Smith Barney, born Dec. 22, 1845 at Nauvoo, Ill. The body is at the parlor of Joseph William Taylor, 25 South West Temple street, and will be sent to Ferron, Utah the home of deceased, for funeral services and burial.

*The Deseret News*, August 11, 1917, Page 5:

**Joseph Smith Barney** – At a local hospital Joseph Smith Barney died Friday. He was born Dec. 22, 1845, in Nauvoo, Ill., and came with his parents to Utah with an early immigrant party. The body is in charge of Joseph William Taylor who will send it to the home in Ferron, Utah for interment.

Joseph's death certificate states he was born December 22, 1845 in Illinois and was 71 years, seven months and 17 days old. His occupation was "Farmer." Joseph's father was listed as Lewis Barney and his mother was Elizabeth Turner. Their birthplace was "Unknown." He died of "Shock following operation / ulcerating prostrate with hemorrhage." The informant was Lawrence Barney; Residence, Ferron, [Emery County,] Utah; Son.

Ormanda Azelia (Rogers) Oviatt Barney died August 21, 1929 at Ferron, Emery County, Utah. She was buried August 25, 1929 in the Ferron City Cemetery, Ferron, Emery County, Utah. Ormanda's funeral notice appeared in the *Emery County Progress, Ferron* (column), August 30, 1929, Page 1:

Funeral services were held Sunday for Mrs. Barney, 80, who died Friday at the home of her son, Lawrence Barney, after a long illness.

Ormanda's death certificate states she was born October 28, 1849 at Iowa and was 79 years, nine months and 24 days old. She was a widow and her occupation was "Housewife." Ormanda's father was listed as Henry Oviatt and her mother was listed as Sally Ray Whitlock. Their birthplace was "Unknown." She died of "Paralysis agitation." The informant was Earl Barney; Son.

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Albert [Eben] Hall, age 20, of Kanosh, Millard County, Utah and [Elzada] Ormanda Barney, age 20, of Kanosh, Millard County, Utah were married October 29, 1888 at Kanosh, Millard County, Utah by James L. Dorrity, Justice of the Peace. The witnesses were Joseph Dawson, Jr. and Caroline Dorrity. (Marriage License, Millard County, Utah, Page 60, Film #482,022, FHL)

**April 28, 1906 / CLAWSON (column) / Page 1:** A surprise was given to the men who returned from Panette mines this week were: Albert Hall, Horace Duncan and Guy King.

**August 17, 1907 / CLAWSON (column) / Page 1:** The people of Clawson have the foundation of the new meeting house completed also the dobies [adobe] and almost all the lumber on hand. The building will be 28 x 50 feet and building of the walls will be commenced soon. The building will be a frame and dobe [adobe] structure. The people of this little town under the direction of our worthy bishop are to be congratulated on their energetic effort in the above respect as our numbers are but few. / Last Sunday evening Elders Hector Evans and Lewis W. Johnson of Castledale were here in the interest of Y.M.M.I.A. work and they reorganized the association here with the following officers: Herman Theide, president; Orson Barney, first counselor; Elder Foote, second counselor; R.E. King, secretary and treasurer; Walter Barney, assistant secretary and librarian, Albert E. Hall and Wm Hitchcock, class leaders. The visiting brethren gave us excellent instructions regarding the winters work and a spiritual feat was enjoyed. Elder Evans favored us with a nice solo, "Abide With Me," which we also enjoyed. We expect to make this winter's work the best ever.

**July 11, 1908 / CLAWSON (column) / Page 1:** The Fourth passed off without much excitement. A nice program was enjoyed in the forenoon. In the afternoon a dance for the children. Racing and games of all kinds were indulged in. Albert Hall being the fastest on foot of the bishopric got a nice silk tie. Mrs. James P. Davis was the winner of a lovely waist for winning the old ladies race. There were prizes of all kinds for the winners. / Albert Hall and John Fullmer are busy making bricks and putting up two kilns 1½ miles

south of town and are going to burn 100,000 or more of brick. Several people are anxious to build homes here.

**October 17, 1908** / *BITS OF LOCAL INFORMATION* (column) / Page 1: At Clawson there are a half dozen cases of typhoid fever. The Hall children aged 17 and 15 [probably Ella and Ruby] respectively have the worst cases and are seriously ill. Dr. Ferguson is looking after them.

**October 24, 1908** / *CLAWSON* (column) / Page 6: All the men have returned from the reservoir. Guy King and Herman Hall coming home ahead of the others on account of being sick. Mr. King is better but Mr. Hall and his sister Ella are both quite ill with typhoid fever. / Albert Hall and John Fullmer are getting ready to build brick residences for themselves and families.

**November 28, 1908** / *CLAWSON* (column) / Page 1: The long siege of typhoid fever seems to have run its course and nearly all of the sick folks are nearly well. At Albert Hall's three children are yet ailing. / John Fullmer is offering his place for sale as he desires to go the Uintah reservation. Albert Hall also expects to make the reservation his future home.

**January 9, 1909** / *CLAWSON* (column) / Page 1: All but two of the Hall children – Ella and Zola – are well and able to be out.

**January 23, 1909** / *LOCAL BRIEFS* (column) / Page 6: Ila, the 8 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Albert E. Hall of Clawson died at the home of her parents on Tuesday of this week of abscess of the lungs. The little girl has been sick since last fall when she was first taken down with typhoid fever. Funeral services held in Clawson on Thursday and the burial was in Ferron Cemetery. [Elva Ila Hall was buried in the Clawson Cemetery, Clawson, Emery County, Utah.]

**March 30, 1912** / *CLAWSON* (column) / Page 1: Misses Ermine and Clista Hall have been spending a few days in Ferron with their grandparents [Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Smith Barney]. / Messrs Herman and Albert Hall have gone to Price to find work.

**March 8, 1913** / *ELMO* (column) / Page 1: Ira Oviatt and Herman Hall of Hiawatha attended the dance last Friday night.

**July 27, 1918** / *COUNTY CORRESPONDENCE* (column) / Page 1: Herman Hall, just home from the training camp, had an accident last Friday night coming in from Clawson for the dance. He was coming in a Ford car with some companions and the car was just toping a hill and hit some loose dirt, turning over about twice. Nobody got hurt but one front wheel of the car was smashed into some kindling wood and the steering gear was bend some. Herman missed the dance.

My father, Albert Eben, Hall, was a good sized man, about 5' 10." He had medium brown hair and gray eyes. He had a very good disposition, never got cross unless something very bad happened. He was a gentle, happy man. I don't remember him ever slapping me and I needed it sometimes. He got along well with people, and was well liked. He used to sing to us a lot. He had a good voice, played the harmonica. Clista used to play the organ, and read music.

Pa was a hard worker. He did some farming, but mostly he was a section foreman over coal cars on the railroad in Oasis, Utah. Sometimes, in deep snow, he would have to get out timber for poles for rail ties and haul them on sleighs.

We didn't own our own home, but we lived in a house by the switch yard. I didn't like the trains as they came in about 12 o'clock at night. We lived in Kanosh for a while, but he was on the railroad then also. He was born in Kanosh, and so was Ma. We lived a lot of places, but I can't remember where. He also worked at a saw mill for our own lumber. They raised molasses and cane, and we would chew the stock. It tasted good.

We went to the 8<sup>th</sup> grade in school. He helped dig artesian wells for other families. Helped his neighbors a lot. He was 2<sup>nd</sup> counselor in the Bishopric in Oasis when I was little. He used to like to hunt rabbits and deer. He didn't like to dance very much so when they [Dad and Ma] went to the dances, I was allowed to go, but not old enough to dance. I remember girls trying to drag him out on the dance floor, and I thought that was so wicked. I was too small to understand.

Pa would help any old tramp that came along. One day one came to our house. Clista and I had eaten but stood watching him eat. I said, "That old tramp is going to eat all our supper up." He [the tramp] laughed. One of my uncles, Luke Tatton, laughed so hard that he had to hold his stomach and go outside.

Dad's sister ran the Co-op in town. That's where he met Ma. He had a big dog that watched over him all the time, and whenever Ma came near he'd growl at her and try to squeeze between them. On a trip when we stopped to eat lunch, the dog came barking and brought his pocket knife to him. Pa had left it somewhere while we were there at Free Camp Grounds. The camp grounds had beautiful rocks on one side of the creek and on the other side it was muddy and ugly. Those were the most wonderful trips I ever had. I remember Ma's pretty dresses, and I would sit and watch her. I thought she was the most beautiful thing there ever was. She had dark curly hair, wore it mostly in a bob. They were married in Kanosh and both are buried in Orangeville, Utah.

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**Elzada Ormanda Barney Hall**  
**Story of My Mother's Life**  
**As Told to Nola Stilson by Clara Ella Hall Stilson, Age 79**  
**January 1970**

My mother, Elzada Barney Hall, was short and plump in her younger years. She was slim and small in her later years. She had fine features and small bones. She was quick, active, wiry, and strong. She could chop wood and still go to a dance afterward.

Of course, there was only buggies and wagons then. When we were at the saw mill working for lumber one time, a man and woman with a little baby in her arms, came past. We always watched the people passing, and as they passed by, the spring seat [on the buggy] came loose and shook the baby right out of the woman's arms. The wheels ran over the baby's head and crushed it. I always remembered it because it was so terrible.

I remember my mother was a sullen, pouty person. I remember Pa trying to coax her out of it. He was so kind, but she wouldn't speak to him. He sure liked his kids. Ma was feisty and took the lead of everything. She was quite good to let us do most things. She was kind in her way, but still strict. She was full of fun and liked to joke. She liked to dance and play ball. She had plenty of boyfriends before she was married. I remember Pa teasing her about some boy. I thought how ridiculous that was, that she would go with some other boy.

One time I overheard the young couples talking about their good times of going with other boys. I thought it was so comical to listen as they didn't know I was listening. Ma said, "There was real fun in those days."

Ma was president of the MIA in Clawson, president of the Relief Society in Clawson about the same time. I was small then. She was also a teacher in some classes. She graduated from 10<sup>th</sup> grade. She said they used to be real strict in school. She was born and raised in Kanosh, Millard County, Utah. I don't know the places she lived as a child.

She had many talents. She was a good speller. She didn't sing as I remember. She knit for her family. She was a good cook. Cooked a lot on the Church Farm at Hinckley's Camp. She cooked for men boarders after she was married, and her family also at Neal's Station. She was good at reading. She sewed everything by hand as she didn't have a sewing machine.

She borrowed a loom to weave carpets to cover the whole floors. They were made out of old rags like the rags we make now. They would spread straw all over the floor and cover the cracks and make a padding underneath. She had lace curtains that hung to the floor. Grandma Barney had the first ones [curtains]. I thought they were just beautiful. They

made them from purchased material by the yard. Someone taught them how. Ma kept the house so clean. She was the best baker. She baked the best "salt rising" bread I ever tasted. She was asked to make it and to take it to all the parties. They always wanted her to bring the bread. She kept her kids so clean. The water was so soft then.

She made lye soap. Saved old grease and rinds to make it with. She used a big iron kettle that everyone used because everyone was good to share everything. They were not ashamed of what they had.

The only thing I can remember about my little sister, "Elnora" is that she died at the age of three weeks of whooping cough. She was the prettiest little thing I ever saw. She had black curly hair. I used to sneak a comb and curl the top around my fingers. It curled so pretty. They had the funeral in our home. We thought it was a party. We didn't realize what was going on only that Ma and Pa were sad. Herm and I had to go to the neighbor's to borrow chairs. We were hopping along having a great time. Herm was so little he could hardly carry them. We didn't have an organ then. I don't remember the funeral at all. Maybe we weren't allowed in [to attend].

We had a lumber house once and a woman was staying with us. I don't remember her name, but the house caught fire in the middle of the night. She didn't want to excite us so she snuck out and climbed up on the roof and poured water on the fire and put it out.

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## **Grandpa and Grandma Hall**

These are some of the experiences I had with Grandpa and Grandma Hall. They lived in Elberta, Utah and they wanted to move to Orangeville. Uncle Barney and Aunt Iola were moving also. They didn't have the means to hire someone to move them down, so they asked me if I would go back with them [to Elberta] and help them move. They had 14 head of cows and a few chickens and other odds and ends. There was a saddle horse for me to ride and drive the cows. Grandpa drove the team and wagon. Uncle Barney and Aunt Iola had an old Model-T Ford car. They loaded all they could on that. It was in the summer time and this is the way we started out.

We went down through Nephi, Fountain Green, Mt. Pleasant, and Fairview, then up through Fairview Canyon and down Huntington Canyon. Uncle Barney and Aunt Iola would go ahead into the towns to find pastures for the cows for the night. When we arrived with the cows and the wagon we'd milk the cows and give the milk to whoever we got the pasture from. If they didn't want it [the milk] we would give it to anyone who did.

We were a comical caravan, strung out along the highway. Grandpa and Grandma were quite old it seemed. We drove the cows alongside of the highway. One day the cows got

out onto the highway. I rode fast to get them off [the highway] and the horse slid on the paved road and fell on top of me. We tied up traffic and caused some excitement. I was lucky it didn't hurt me.

We left Fairview, the last town and meandered up the canyon, when we arrived at the top of Huntington Canyon, we stayed there for a couple of days to let the horses and cows rest. We would milk the cows onto the ground just to empty their bags. We were two more days getting home to Orangeville. It was 14 days all together to make the trip. After we got home, Grandpa gave me the horse and a heifer calf for helping him. I was about 16 years old. I got really close to Uncle Barney and Aunt Iola at this time.

Grandpa and Grandma lived in Clawson for quite a few years during my early childhood. They always had some of us grandchildren staying with them for a week or so at a time. Mostly the boys, Keith, Ray, and I. Sometimes all three of us at the same time. Grandma was spry and feisty and made us tow-the-line. But she was good to us and had a heart-of-gold. She used to play little games with us. She would snap at Grandpa. He was so good natured he would just grin. We loved and respected both of them very much.

Nola learned to love them also. After we were married, we lived across the street from them. I can still remember when they built their home on Aunt Clista's lot. They were in their 70s. Grandpa would be up on the roof working, and Grandma would climb up on the ladder to hand him tools, nails, and boards. We'd hold our breath to see this little wisp of a woman going up that ladder. It was quite high. She was some past 70 years old. She had a little white bob of hair on top [of her head] and always wore a neat and clean apron. Grandma passed away shortly after that. They hadn't lived in the house long, and it wasn't completely finished inside when Grandma died. Nola sang, "That Wonderful Mother of Mine" at her funeral.

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## **My Memories of Grandpa and Grandma Hall**

When I was seven years old, I stayed with Grandpa and Grandma Hall at Clawson. I stayed with them for quite often. Their house seemed so big and so were the rooms. Grandma always made the grandchildren cakes for their birthdays. She would bake a nickel in the cake, whoever got the piece with the nickel could keep it. One time Kenna and I went for a ride with them in their car to Ferron. That seemed special.

Grandma's brother, Uncle Arv (Orval) Barney run a store and service station across the street. He had a glass container with big jawbreakers of all colors. You could barely get them in your mouth, so good!!

Once when I was about 10 years old, I went to Elbert to stay with Grandpa and Grandma. The houses were far apart and no one lived close by. It was real rocky country. There was a dirt cellar underneath the house and I was scared to death of the snakes. Grandma [caught snakes and] would go out and chop them with the ax. She was really brave to do that all by herself. Grandpa finally closed and boarded up the cellar door to keep the snakes out. There were lots of gophers and I didn't have much to do, so I would take a stick and push them [the gophers] back down into their holes.

I remember Grandma had a pink button box. I thought it was so pretty, it was full of all kinds of old buttons. They had been cut off old clothing, and still had thread in them. I would sit and cut the thread off for Grandma.

Uncle Allen and Aunt Verda ran a service station and store. There was a big cement ditch that drained into a duck pond. Once we went wading and I slipped and fell [in the duck pond] and just about drown. I was so scared but the other kids pulled me out.

They had a wagon and Grandma drove the team out to her brother's place, Lawrence and Esther Barney. One day she was driving out to wash her clothes. The road was narrow and she drove so close to the pond I was afraid she would tip over into the pond. I was worried about the awful ducks. Grandpa farmed over there then.

I was scared of the artesian well, afraid that the kids would fall in. I was scared of about everything I guess except one little pet pig. He followed the dog all over. When the dog chased cars, the pig went right along with him. He'd follow us around until time to eat the swill with the rest of the pigs. Grandma and I were so attached to that little pig we tried to hide it so Grandpa wouldn't sell it.

When we went to church we all crowded into their little blue coupe. I don't know how so many [people] got in. Uncle Barney and I rode the running board or fender. The church was just a basement. The top wasn't built on yet. Grandma taught a Sunday school class.

One Sunday, Grandpa was talking to someone and told us to wait in the car for him. While we were sitting there we noticed a man's old sloppy hat on the seat. Grandma said, "I don't know whose hat that is, but I guess he will come and get it." A boy came out and I said, "Is this your hat?" He said, "Yes," but just stood there staring at us. He said he worked for someone near Grandpa's farm. Grandma said we'd take him home as soon as Grandpa came out, then she said, "How did you get here?" He said, "I came in this car." His car was exactly like Grandpa's. Grandma was so embarrassed. She apologized and we hurried and got into the right car. Grandma said, "Don't tell Grandpa or he will tease us." So on the way home I kept laughing and Grandpa said, "All right, what's so funny?" I finally told him and he really laughed. He was so good natured, but Grandma was really stubborn, she would get mad at someone and wouldn't speak to them for days.

I remember how the coyotes would howl and the dogs would howl back. Elberta was the most lonesome and dreary place I ever saw. I stayed for a month and they [Grandpa and

Grandma] took me home. When going down Price Canyon, Grandpa stopped to put water in the radiator. The car got tipped sideways into the ditch and got stuck. It was November and so cold no one would stop to help us. Finally a car did stop and there were two couples in it. They were dressed really nice. The men waded into the ditch and pushed us out. Grandpa offered to pay them but they wouldn't take anything. We went up to Peerless to Aunt Ora and Uncle Bill Potter's and were there for Thanksgiving dinner. Grandma wanted me to go back with her but I couldn't stand the dreary farm any longer, not long after that, Grandpa and Grandma moved to Orangeville. I remember dancing with Grandpa on their golden wedding anniversary in Clawson, Utah.

I was in awe of Grandma and I am afraid I didn't like her too much when I was little because I thought she was very cranky. I was glad to read the memories of the others about her and as I read the description I longed to have been able to know her better. I can see that my personality is very much like hers. I can be a pouty and stubborn person too, maybe that is why I didn't care for her. We are too much alike.

My last memory of Grandma was when she died. We arrived at their little house by Aunt Clistie's shortly after she had died and I remember seeing her on the bed with the coins on her eyes and mouth. Children are funny, even though I was in awe of Grandma, when Grandpa got married again I was upset. I sat in a neighbor's swing in Latuda and told them this woman could never take the place of my Grandma Hall.

My memories of Grandpa are also of the prayers being said before breakfast. Kneeling on the floor by our chairs and listening as he prayed. I thought how long these prayers were, after smelling the good food all through the kneeling prayer, we got to sit on our chairs and have another prayer on the food. Being quite small at that time, and not understanding too much about family prayers, I wondered why we had to have two prayers before we could eat.

My fondest memories of Grandpa was of him driving his Model-T Ford to Latuda to visit us after Grandma died. He really tore up the road in that old car and my dad (Uncle Herm) always worried that he would kill himself. I think it was a relief to everyone when he stopped driving it [the Model-T] and it sat by the back of their little house in Orangeville, Utah until he died. I loved to sit in it and pretend I was driving. I have often wondered what happened to it.

Grandpa and Grandma's golden wedding celebration was also very impressive to me. I thought it was really a wondrous thing that two people could live together for 50 whole years. Seeing all the relatives that attended gave me much food for thought too. I couldn't believe that I was related to so many people. I was also proud of the part on the program that Ilene and I did and hoped that Grandpa and Grandma like it.

The last of my memories of Grandpa Hall was when he was in a nursing home in Salt Lake City and I would go up with my parents to visit him. I knew he didn't really know us but it was nice to see him anyway. I have always been glad that the last time I saw him I was able to lay my first born child, Kathy, in his arms and say, "Here is your great grandchild." He thought she was cute, although I am sure he didn't realize who she was or for that matter who I was.

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## **Grandpa and Grandma Hall**

I'm writing in response to the *Hall's Crossing Newsletter* which I have enjoyed very much. By the way, I'm a "talker" not a "writer" but I have tried to put a few thoughts together concerning my memories of Grandpa and Grandma Hall.

I lived with them for one year while attending 1<sup>st</sup> grade in Orangeville (1934 – 1935). We lived in a house just as you come around the small curve as you entered Orangeville. This was on the north side of the highway and seemed to be among a lot of trees. Grandpa

would carry me to the highway and stand me on a gunny sack to keep my feet dry while we waited for the bus.

I remember going along the ditch bank in a field behind the house with Grandma gathering asparagus. She would collect it and put it in her gathered up apron. I thought this was great fun. I also remember watching Grandma as he combed, brushed, rolled, and wrapped her long white hair around her head every morning. This fascinated me, and I loved to watch this procedure.

I also remember sitting in a window in their home playing with her button box and buttons. Grandpa had punched a hole in a small evaporated milk can in which I saved nickels. He would make sure I always had a few nickels in the can.

I remember going to church each Sunday. It was such a long time to sit there, but I don't think we missed many Sundays. I also remember playing outside of the church while Grandma, along with the other relief society sisters, spent the afternoon quilting and visiting.

After I went back to Park City to live with my family, we used to go to Orangeville for weekend visits. Dad would get off work about 3:00 p.m. and we would leave Park City at that time. It seemed like a long way to go, and a very long ride. Grandpa and Grandma were always happy to see us. When it came time for us to leave for home, Grandma would say she was going to hide us grandchildren so we could live with them.

They used to stay with us quite often in Park City. I remember them staying one summer while they were trying to save enough money to buy a new car. I still have a set of children's play dishes that they gave me the last Christmas they spent with us. These dishes were china, accented with gold and had little blue birds. It was always such a special time when they were with us as I felt like they really loved us and enjoyed being in our home.

I always thought Grandpa was so handsome with his beautiful head of white hair. My Mother always said that if any man ever got to heaven it would be Grandpa Hall. She always admired and respected him as he was always so kind to her.

Aunt Ell and Uncle Mel Stilson were always a special part of our trips to Orangeville. We could hardly wait to visit with Fawn, Owen, Roma, Cleo, and their dog, "Roots." They always had a beautiful garden, good apple trees and a milk cooler covered with wet burlap in a tree by their house. They always treated us so nice.

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## **Memories of Albert E. and Elzada Barney Hall**

If I could recall that far back, recollections of Grandpa and Grandma Hall began with my birth, for I was born in their home at Standardville, Carbon County, Utah. Grandma assisted the doctor, and Grandpa later gave me my name and blessing.

Memories of them can be triggered by the fragrance of a yellow rosebush or even the sweetness of a potato nipped by the frost, names of the places in which they lived can bring back the sound of their voices at work or resting in the twilight hours. Grandma had an infectious laugh which I seem to hear on many occasions and also Grandpa's soft chuckle.

The LDS ward house in Clawson on the south end of the town holds my first true awareness of them. This is where we would spend the 4<sup>th</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup> with all the other cousins. We'd compete with the town kids in the foot races and other games. Our parents always contributed generously to these events. I remember Grandma once saying to a very disgruntled neighbor that her grandchildren had taken first place in every age group that raced. Grandma wasn't one for bragging much and gave compliments sparingly, but evidently she felt justified this time because of the other person's attitude.

For a time, they lived just north of the log-house on a rather barren knoll in an old, large building that had been a school house or something of that nature. I can still see wall-to-wall beds on the floor of that big room when relatives came to visit and Aunt Zel playing solitary at a small table, and the squealing and shouting as Uncle Barney and Uncle Harold rolled us cousins in a quilt, then tossed us high into the air to be caught by the quilt again. I know we were sometimes brats and teased them constantly, and I am sure they'd like to have smacked us but they used great restraint.

Grandpa and Grandma also lived in a clapboard house on the northwest end of Clawson which I remember best. There Grandma would take her eggs in a basket to Uncle Arv's store and use them to purchase things she needed. Grandma was an active and energetic lady, and worked very hard with what she had. Grandpa was easier going, but could be assertive when the occasion demanded.

They were both good at relating stories, both of the gospel and of their own personal experiences, and I very much enjoyed listening to them. They gave me my "church history education" and while living in Clawson, I refused to go to Sunday school class unless it was Grandma's. She, of course, let me go with her even though I was much younger than her group. I too remember what a choice feeling it was to turn the backs of the chairs toward the kitchen table and kneel with Grandpa and Grandma at family prayer.

If I related all of our slap happy experiences at Elberta, this would be a book. Keith and I chasing cows, riding old Molly in the field, or Jake the derrick horse, or going places with Uncle Barney in the Model-T sometimes to and from work, to watch a flood, or to the church with him, Aunt Iola and Grandpa and Grandma's. Then the time we caught fish when the canal was drained while Ray walked ahead killing snakes. Irita skinning her backside from a fast departure from the old pickup. Corn and chicken roasts, walking

home to Grandpa's after church, harmonizing in the moonlight with Rita, Dawn, and whatever cousins happened to be visiting, watching, Dawn, Ruby, and Bly get ready for a date. Oh, what special times they were, and Grandpa and Grandma waiting and watching in the background.

Of course, we never could stay out late without getting caught by their blabber-mouth-mantle clock which always managed to bong the hour just as we'd step inside the door. I remember one time Grandpa asked me what time I'd gotten home from a date when we were living in Orangeville. I said, "Grandpa, you know darn well what time it was because of the old-watch-dog-clock." He had a good laugh over that, but Grandma made me give her a thorough accounting of my reason for being so late.

Grandma used to tell me of her girlhood and of a special cousin she loved named "Luke," also of her parents and family. Grandpa talked about the Indians. He told stories about Chief Kanosh, his love for the Henry Mountains and the Red Rock Country near Kanab and Escalante. He discovered several cliff dwellings and played among them while herding cows in that area as a young boy. My neighbor in Orangeville, "Grandpa Charles Stilson" told me that Grandpa and his brothers helped herd church cattle at Windsor Castle (Pipe Springs), Arizona.

The grief that Grandma and Grandpa felt at losing their three children was often spoken of. Grandma had a "1<sup>st</sup> Grade Primmer" that had belonged to Ila. She would sometimes remove it from the glass fronted book case and let me read it. Then tenderly place it back. I wonder whatever become of it. She treasured it so much.

Grandpa had quite a sense of humor and laughed easily. He told Keith and I about the experience he had that always made me smile. He said he answered an ad for a product guaranteed to eliminate potato bugs for one or two dollars. When the package arrived it contained two small blocks of wood with instructions to lay potato bug on Block A and hit with Block B, guaranteed to kill instantly. Then Grandpa laughed as heartily as we did.

He enjoyed pleasant conversation and usually tried to see the bright side of things. Sometimes he was criticized for being too passive, but it was hard for him trying to be a farmer when he had little aptitude for it. He'd had a chance for a good promotion on the railroad which would have meant a move to Provo, but Grandma influenced by her father, prevailed upon him to move to Emery County and try farming, and to please them he did.

Grandpa and Grandma were both intelligent and in spite of their humble circumstances, they were always reading whatever was available. Along with the scriptures and church magazines, music was also a love of their lives. Often the hymns I hear are reminders of the happy times I spend in their home as I recall Grandma singing or humming them. I understand Grandpa sang a lot in his younger years, and they were both very pleased with the musical talents of Uncle Barney and Uncle Harold with their trombone and coronet.

Most of the girls sang also, maybe Uncle Harold can tell us more about music in their home.

Grandma had very little to work with, nevertheless she was an exceptionally good cook. Sometimes a meal was just a potato, white gravy and a "wilted lettuce salad" but with her bread, and a glass of milk it was as good as any banquet. Her germade or cracked wheat "mush" with thick cream served in her tan and blue crockery bowls is something that has never been equaled to most of the family. In Elberta their home on the "flats" and had bare board floors covered with a few rag rugs. I can remember how Grandma would scrub the floors and then make them shine by mopping them with milk.

Grandma and Grandpa received their greatest joy from church attendance and activity. They tried to live the gospel to the best of their ability. Like us, they were not perfect, but they never stopped trying to do the best they could. Bishop Cox in Orangeville told me that one time he counseled them knowing their income was just a meager check, he told them they were not expected to pay their tithing. He was quickly told that they would obey the law of the tithe in gratitude for blessings, and because they had vowed to do so.

The hours I spent in my Grandparent's home were truly happy and cherished times, when I wasn't visiting them we were living in the same town so I saw them constantly while I was growing up.

I will always be grateful to my parents that they let me have this special time of loving and learning with Grandpa and Grandma. It was such a privilege being able to be part of the "extended" family of grandparents, uncles, aunts, and cousins. Of course, we have had disagreements but they weren't as numerous or as memorable as the good times we had together on picnics, camping trips, and visits to Grandpa and Grandma or to one another's homes.

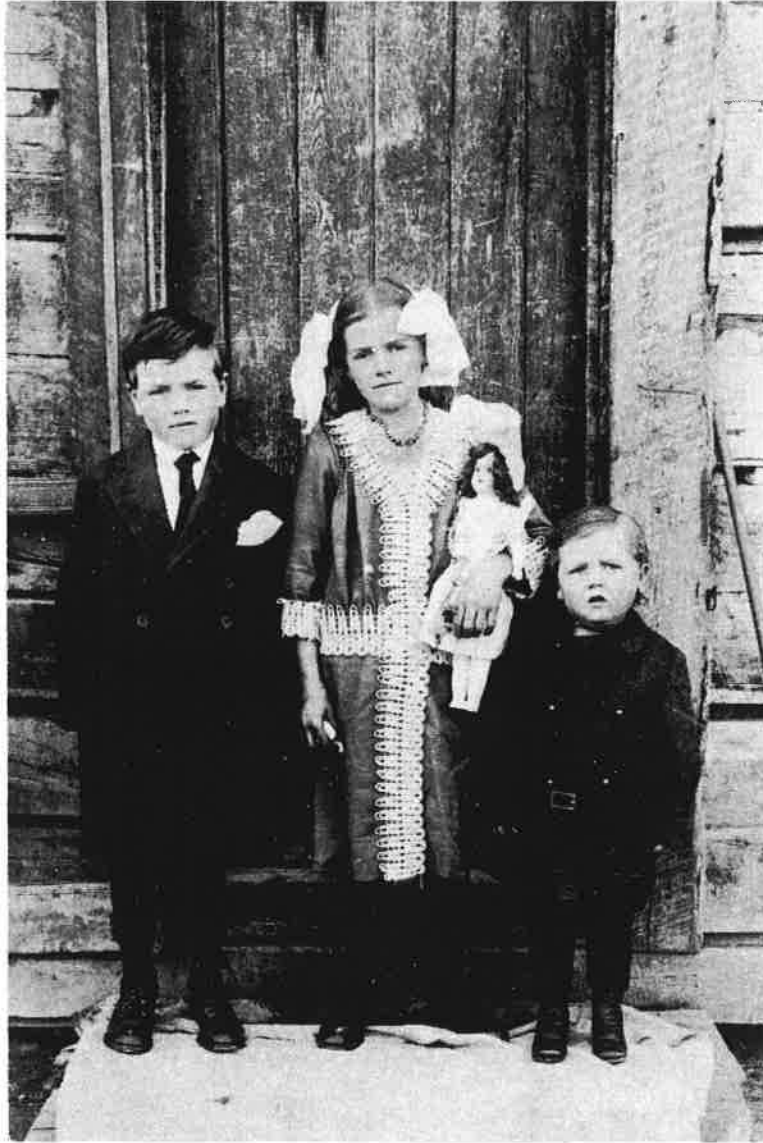

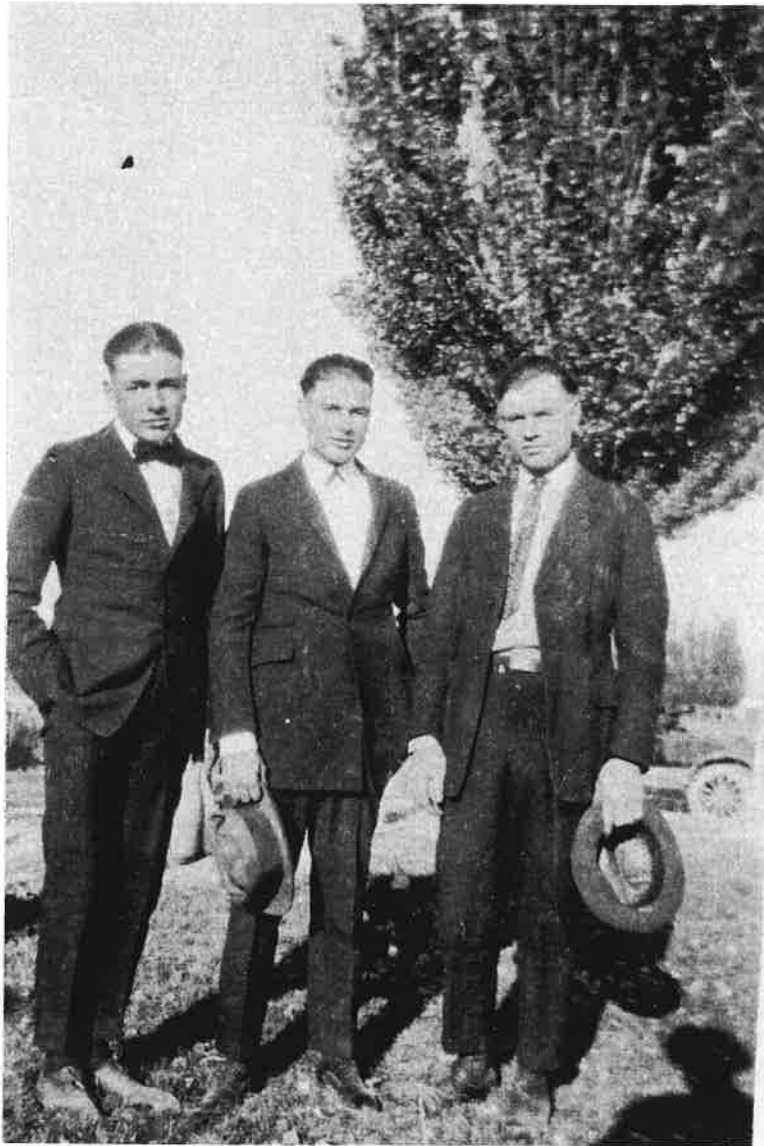

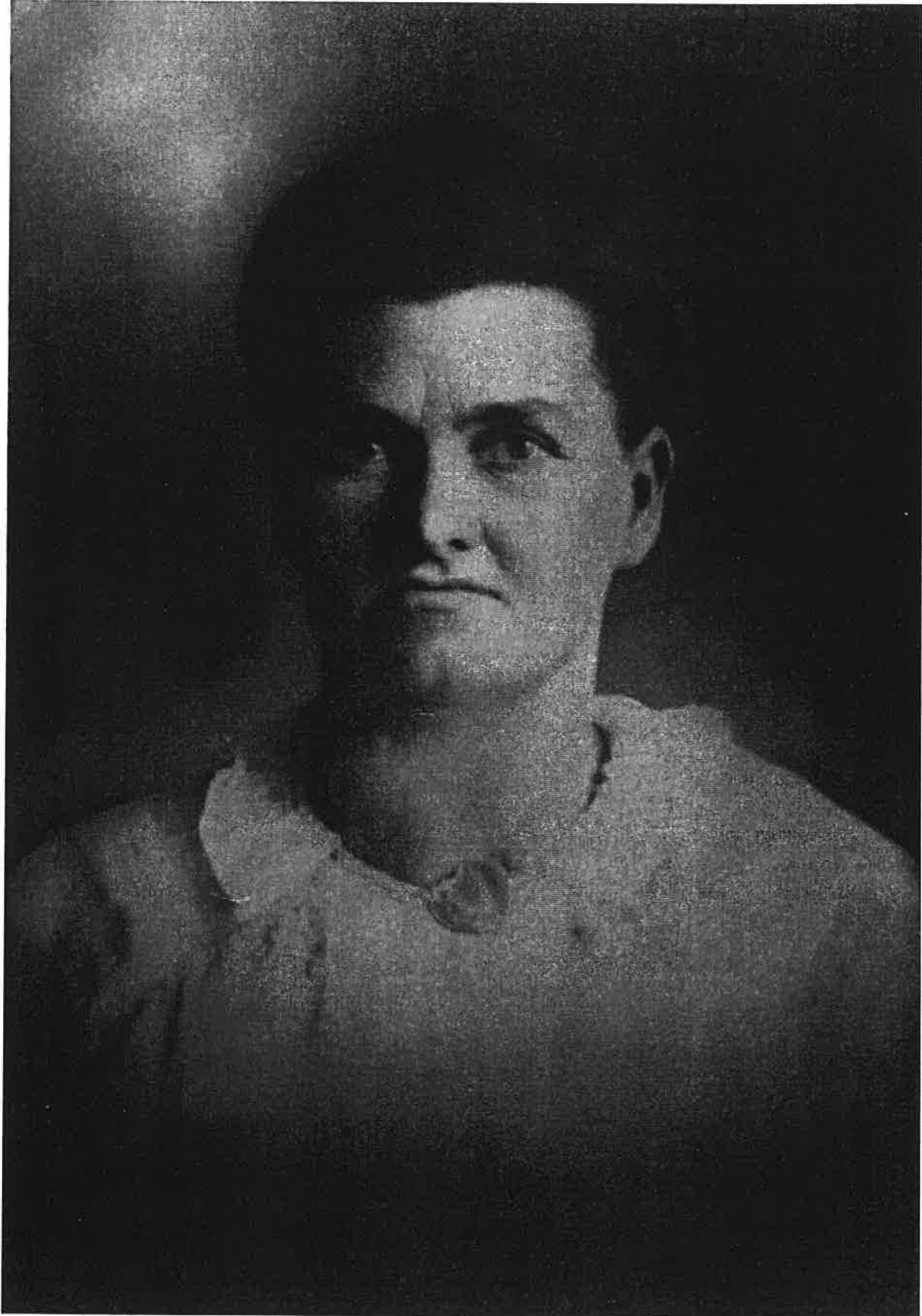

The following is a short History Grandma (Elzada Barney) Hall started to write. Even though she never finished it, I thought you might like to have it as she wrote it in her own hand writing.

History of Albert E Hall son of Charles Hall & Caroline Freeman Born 29 Dec 1868 at Hamast Millard Co. Utah. His parents were pioneers. Charles Hall was Born 5 Feb 1823 in Belmont Maine. when he was a young man <sup>older</sup> him + his Brother Job Hall had heard so much about the Mormons they decided to go to Utah to see for themselves just what kind of people they were they arrived here in Utah + after visiting with the Mormons a short time decided to remain with them so they joined the church + were baptised + each one of them married a Mormon girl. Charles Hall was married to Caroline Freeman about 1849. They had a family of 9 children Albert Ebon

was the youngest one of the family he was born in 1868 so he was a native Pioneer + His parents lived in Salt Lake City untill about 1858 then he moved to Parowan for a while + back to Salt Lake again about 1862. + to Hamast in 64. or about that time. + was living at Hamast when Albert E was born in 1868.

He helped to build the road into the Sem Juan + also the Hole-in-the-rock he was one of the men to build a road thru there + was a ferry man on the Colorado river when Albert was a small boy, he remembers his fathers ferry boats + how he used to take people across the river. he had some narrow escapes from being drowned in the river when he was very small boy. I once his mother jumped into the river + saved him when he fell in + once his father saved him from drowning. one day he fell of the boat + his dad jumped in and got him out when he was very small boy his parents moved to Escalante + he used to heard corn on the hills + as a boy he had lots of fun scrambling over hill + dale with his cows.

Brother Hall, in keeping with thy righteous desire, I bless thee in the name of the Savior of the world and seal upon thee a comfort and timely blessing, thou art highly favored of the Lord, son of promise thy possibilities are beyond thy conception. I bless thee in the name of Jesus Christ that the honest toil of thy hands may be fruitful. Thou mayest be in possession of sufficient of this worlds goods and treasures to pay thine obligations to all man to care for, to educate and succor to thy family, to pay one-tenth of thy increase into the treasury of the Lord, thine offerings unto the poor and thy tribute at the family alter to eat bread and drink water at the table of the Lord, aye and to teach and preach by precept and example the sons and daughters of God to do likewise, yes, I bless thee with wisdom and discretion, that thou mayest escape the pitfalls for there are those who would snare thee, who would make other than truth for thou hast been decoyed into uneasy obligations. How be it, I bless thee that thou mayest emancipate thyself and profit by thy experience. It is human to error but divine to forgive. God hath forgiven thee, brother, and of thee it is required to forgive all men to lead and point the way of a higher and more beautiful life. God hath purposed to prove thee, Brother Hall, for there is preparing for thee and thine a most beautiful inheritance and through thy faithfulness thy forevision shall be made beautiful they soul enriched. Thy spiritual batteries charged with life eternal. I bless thee, Elder, in Israel, with the spirit of the hour with the spirit of prophecy and implore thee to lift up thy voice and spare not, warn this generation both home and abroad to repent ere the judgment of God overtake them for the Lord will require of thee all time and talent with which He hath endowed thee.

I seal thee up against the powers of the destroyer against the powers of darkness and bid thee be of good cheer to smile, to pray and sing and inspiration of heaven shall anchor thy soul forever, to this end and purpose, Sister Hall, do I bless thee and dedicate thy life and service unto the accomplishments and consummation of Zion's purposes, and seal thee

up unto eternal life to come forth on the morning of the first resurrection, even so be ye faithful, for so be it, in the name of Jesus Christ, Amen.
