Kari "Okay Grandma tell me your name and birthday?"

Grandma "My name is Geraldean Mitton Hill, and I was born June the 14 1934, in Logan Utah."

Kari "What are your parents' names and the years they were born?"

Grandma "My mothers name is Ruby Lunberg Mitton, and my dad's name is Carl Garret Mitton, my mom was born in 1913 and my dad was born in 1911. My mother was born in Logan, my dad was born in Wellsville.

Kari "Did you have any brothers or sisters?"

Grandma "I have one brother-Paul-five years younger than I am."

Kari "Can you tell me what is like growing up?"

Grandma "Well when I was growing up we lived in Wellsville, until I was about seven.

Then we moved to Salt Lake City, from when I was seven and in the second grade until we moved back to Wellsville, so I could start school in the sixth grade; and this is during World War I, my dad being a machinist, the army needed him in Salt Lake to make artillery for the military, and he made shells for the military. I actually have a salt and peppershakers that my dad made me out of two big shells.

Kari "Um...so did your dad work just for the military or did he work on anything else?" Grandma "Well he at the Smallon plant, they had a contract with the military, and they needed a machinist who knew how to do what he did, and so that is why were in Salt Lake.

Kari "Your mom was a stay at home mom right?"

Grandma "yes she was."

Kari "Ok do you remember anything about living in Salt Lake and the war?"

Grandma "Yes, the thing that bothered me most about the war is that we had hospitals in

Salt Lake where they would send a lot of the injured soldiers, ad I would see a lot of men

the were minus body parts, and their legs or an arm was missing, and that really bothered

me a lot. We also had rationings stamps, and you had to have stamps to get gas, to get

meat, and to get shoes and stuff during the war.

Kari "So how much schooling did you do in Salt Lake?"

Grandma "I done 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th."

Kari "and you went back to Wellsville in 6th grade?"

Grandma "Yes sixth grade!"

Kari "Do you have any memories from elementary, games, special days, just fun memories from

elementary?"

Grandma "um... we played the same games as I think they probably play now, just on the bars and

tag, just the simple kid games. When we moved back to Wellsville, Friday was just a fun day at

school, and we would have a movie or a game or a dance, just something that was fun, and on the

Noon hour they would turn music on, everyday right around lunch, and that was fun to look forward

to."

Kari "That sounds fun!"

Kari "When did you get married?"

Grandma "I got married on September the second in 1949."

Kari "What was grandpas full name?"

Grandma "Elmer Dellas Hill."

Kari "You got married after ninth grade right?"

Grandma "Right!"

Kari "So tell me what plans you had for your family?"

Grandma "I planned for my family, lots of people don't believe this, but all of my children were going to have their own birthday, I did not want more then one child born in one month. I did not want any holiday babies, I just didn't want any babies around holidays, and therefore I have a January, a February, a March, an April, and a May, um... August and September babies."

Kari "do you remember any stories about your family or and traditions you started when you and Grandpa started your family, or 'Spring Cleaning'?"

Grandma "OH YES! Spring cleaning was a big thing, we would wash the walls, wash the cupboards and scrub floors; you name it and it got washed."

Kari "What traditions did you start when you started your family?"

Grandma "Well on Christmas eve everyone got a new pair of Pajamas to wear to bed, the got to open that present, and they would hang up their stockings after they got their pajamas."

Kari "What kind of career did you have?"

Grandma "OK, I went back to school, when my family was almost all grown up. I finished high school and then went into nursing, and then later on I took years of creative writing.

Kari "You worked in Logan Hospital right?"

Grandma "Yes in Logan Hospital, for 15 years."

Kari "What area did you work in while you were at Logan Hospital?"

Grandma "I worked in Pediatrics mostly but when your sisters were born I went down to the nursery and took care to Tara and Tessa, when they were born."

Kari "Can you tell me about working in the hospital, any stories or anything you can remember?"

Grandma "Well it was... it was, Pediatrics was a good place to work for the most part, because little children used to get sick quick and well quick; every once in awhile you would loose a patient, and that was always very hard. They taught us in school that we should never get emotionally attached to a patient. That was not a good thing. We would not work well if we were emotionally attached. But every once in awhile you just couldn't help it."

Kari "Is there anything different about medicines today, from when you were working in the hospital?"

Grandma "There are a lot of different things today, especially the drugs, since I worked there has been so many new drugs, and I am not familiar with them, and it frustrates me sometimes, because I used to

be familiar with most of the drugs, but I'm not anymore... and that's just the way it. What they still use I am still familiar with, but the new ones, I'm not."

Kari "Have things changed from when you were working in the hospital and now after women has had a baby?"

Grandma "Well when your mother was born I was in the hospital for a week, now they send them home in a few hours, which I don't think is right because a mother and a new born needs to be watched for more then a few hours."

Kari "What did grandpa do?"

Grandma "He was working and building houses, he remodeled homes, and he built the post office in town, he worked on church houses and was a contractor, he held about every license the state of Utah would allow."

Kari "How many kids did you have?"

Grandma "Seven!"

Kari "Growing up or even when you started your family, did you ever belong to s club or an originations?"

Grandma "Yes, I did belong to a social club one time several years ago, but I dropped out, because there were a couple of girls, all they ever wanted to do is say mean things about their husbands, and I didn't like that. SO I thought that the best thing for me to do is just drop out, and so I did."

Kari "Do you know where our ancestors came from?"

Grandma "To the best of my knowledge my mothers ancestors came from Sweden, and my dad's ancestor came from England."

Kari "Did they come here for religious reasons?"

Grandma "I don't know it to be a fact but I am guessing that yes they did?"

Kari "Wait so where did grandpas family come from?"

Grandma "I'm not sure I am really not sure, I know that he has some French back ground, and in the book it looks that there is some Indian, but I can't be positive."

Kari "Do you recall any stories about family history?"

Grandma "Well one of my ancestors on my mothers side, styled the horns on the oxen that holds the baptismal font up in the temples, and that is about the only thing that I can think of, and I had a lot of temple workers in my background on my mothers side of the family."

Kari "Do you have any hobbies?"

Grandma "Yes I collect and I write, I collect my villages and that is about it and I love my family."

Kari "Did you play a musical instrument?"

Grandma "Yes I did, I played the cornet in Jr. High."

Kari "And you were in the marching band right?"

Grandma "Yes I was and those uniforms were so hot and I marched in the parades and I played in the graduation ceremony from Jr. High."

Kari "From the songs and the dancing and the music now, are any of them the same as they were when you were growing up?"

Grandma "I think that the jitterbug and the fast dancing are just going to come and go, but the slow dancing and the waltz and those kinds will go on and on still."

Kari "Are there any special foods you ate as a child or regularly ate?"

Grandma "Well my mother used to bake bread a lot, and she could make the best smoothest gravy that you ever could taste; and it was really really good and she could make it out of absolutely nothing. It was amazing! Plus I have a cake recipe that is handed down from my grandmother her mother, its surprising that is so good with such few ingredients, and she used to make that a lot, it was a white cake."

Kari "Did anyone in your family ever make homemade toys?"

Grandma "My grandpa Lunberg made me and little table and chairs and a little dolly high chair."

Kari "Do you still have those?"

Grandma "And your grandpa made a little table and chairs for the kids one year for Christmas, when we had our children, he put Formica on the table, and on the bottoms and the backs of the chairs, it was really cute. I'm not sure whether or not I have the stuff that my grandpa made for me I will have to go down stairs and look."

Kari "Did your parents have any hobbies or interests while you were growing up?"

Grandma " my dad used to read a lot! My mother wasn't a reader but she was a spiffy house keeper, her main purpose in life was keeping her house tidy and clean, plus they belonged to a riding club and they went horse back riding a lot."

Kari "DO you have any memories of, the different wars that you've lived through ro the different generations and how they have changed?"

Grandma "Well the generations change a lot, I remember the second World War because it upset me and frustrated me when I would see soldiers come back with limbs gone.

Um... the other wars would always be a concern, as we would go and know about them but its not like seeing it, that was hard to know that this was actually happening, and that was really hard. The second World War started in 1941 and it was over in 1945."

Kari "So you were younger when this was going on?"

Grandma "OH YES!!! Very young, that is probably why it sticks in my mind so hard."

Kari "When you lived in Salt Lake and working for the military and stuff was he gone a lot?"

Grandma "No, where he worked was right there in Salt Lake, he came and went just like an ordinary job."

Kari "What kind of house did you live in when you lived in Salt Lake?"

Grandma "We lived in an apartment, it was a nice apartment brand new, and it was very nice, me and my friend used to walk up the hill and go and play dolls in the capital building."

Kari "Did you have your own bedroom in your house?"

Grandma "Paul and I usually shared one, back from Salt Lake to Wellsville we each had our own room."

Kari "UH... didn't you say that once you moved back to Wellsville your dad had a hobby of farming?"

Grandma "Yes, and he had some cows too."

Kari "Was the farm right next to your house?"

Grandma "It was up on the hill, just a around the house, it was just a small farm it was just a hobby for him, it wasn't the livelihood of the family, he worked in a machine shop."

Kari "Do you remember any family vacations or any thing like that that you can remember?"

Grandma "I remember going to Oregon with my mother, when I was small, and we went across the Columbia River; and it has the big swinging bridge. We were on the bridge when it swung, so that they could pull the big tugboat out, and it scared me to death and I have never liked water from that day to today."

Kari "Any family vacations with you and grandpa did?"

Grandma "Yes we went on some vacations to the park, and to Bear Lake. You know where you could take children and they could have a good time, and we could all have a good time."

Kari "What are some favorite family stories that include your parents, siblings or your children?"

Grandma "Well I remember the one about your mother. When she was born the nurse was bringing in this little black haired baby, and she looked at me and I was so blonde and then she looked at you mom again and he hair was so dark and she said 'I think that

I brought you the wrong baby' and I said no no no that is my baby she is mine {laughing} ya that was...ya and they took her back out."

Kari "Have you been a member of the LDS church all your life?"

Grandma "Yes!"

Kari "Were you married in the temple?"

Grandma "I was married civilly for two years and then we went to the temple and your mother was about eight months old."

Kari "Do you have any other stories or memories for me grandma?"

Grandma "From what period?"

Kari "um...any period!"

Grandma "Did I tell you that when I was going to school that we would write skits, and we put them on for assemblies, and we would have a good time doing that, and we would have ballgames and dances and movies on Fridays. Fridays were just a fun afternoon, it was something to look forward to, and it was fun."

Kari "Man I wish that we would something fun like that."

Grandma "Yep it was fun. I danced with your grandpa all noon hour."

Kari "When did you meet grandpa?"

Grandma "I met him the summer before I started the seventh grade."

Kari "An you just fell in love with him?"

Grandma "Well not off hand..."

Kari "How did you guys meet?"

Grandma "He was teasing me and didn't think kindly to that. But then not to long after that I went to the 'Golden Green Ball' at mutual, and I don't know if they still have that but then he swooped me off my feet, and I was a goner."

Kari "So did you guys just date for awhile and then get married at the end of ninth grade?"

Grandma "Uh Hu."

Kari "And grandpa was a year older right?"

Grandma "Yes."

Kari "So did he finish high school?"

Grandma "After we were married. Then he had to go to Salt Lake for two days to take or to get his contractors license, he had to test for two solid days; and he passed everything."

Kari "That's cool. Um... did grandpa ever go to college?"

Grandma "No."

Kari "And you went to a college class of writing right?"

Grandma "I went to two years of writing after I finished high school."

Kari "So how is your writing coming along now?"

Grandma "Very well, thank you!"

DIARY OF ISAAC HILL

(Great-grandfather of Geraldine Litster Walters)

About 1950, Andrew Jensen, the Church of Jesus Christ of Later Saints Historian, learned of the existence of a personal diary kept by Isaac Hill. He inquired of its whereabouts through his descendants at Huntington, Emery County, Utah. The family knew nothing of the diary at the time, but finally located it in the possession of Isaac Hill, son of Isaac Hill, of Idaho. The diary was sent to Elisabeth Hill Cook Johnson, a daughter of Isaac Hill (Grandmother of Geraldine Litster Walters), who asked her daughter-in-law, Mary Ann Mackelprang Cook, to make a copy of it before turning it over to the L.D.S. Church.

In about 1959 Pearl Cook Day, a great-granddaughter of Isaac Hill, made another copy of the original diary, Mary Ann Cook having received the original from the Church Office where it had been for several years. This draft, together with Mary Ann's copy, is the basis of the following history. By comparing the two copies I have used the exact wording, spelling, etc. as used by Isaac Hill. The only change is the format, that the dates are all in columnar form on the left side, and the first word of each line is capitalized. These two rules were apparently not always followed in the original diary. Mary Ann and her daughter then turned the original diary to the Daughters of Pioneers and it is there in their keeping now.

Mary Ann said the diary was "written on 6 X 8 inch sheets of thin blue paper in a very condensed form. The mice had fringed the edges and many words were demared by age..."

It is a great joy to all relatives, too, that in passing through all the hardships and trials of the gospel being restored in these days, that this man proved faithful to the end." (William Preston Cook.)

adorn them with inteligants and buty to prepare them as a blesing from the hand of the allmity and hee will polish them after the fimiltude of a palis and it shal com to

pass when you shal receve a knolage of thees things perfectly and know of a shurity concerning your inheratanc and the promist blesings for you and your children and your Fathers hous and your linage and the time shal come when you shall know of a shurity the desins of God conserning you and the purposes and the blessings conserning you that is promist you tuching your linage both spirituly and temperly but suffice it to say that you shal bee preserved till you have them reveal to you and if faithful your years shal bee meny and you shal hav and your postarity

after you and you shal hav a crown of etarnel lives in the mansions of your Father these blesings I seel upon your hed in the naim of Jesus even so amain.

MISSIONARY TO "THE STATES"

Isaac Hill left with 73 other Elders with handcarts for a mission to the states. They left on April 23,

1857 and arrived back in Salt Lake City on June 21, 1858 after a hard but successful mission. In the book "Handcarts to Zion" they had several handcart songs submitted and sung. One was for the missionaries that left with handcarts back east. It was written by one of the missionaries, Elder Philip Margetts and was sung to the tune of "Oh, Susannah".

THE MISSIONARY'S HANDCART SONG

No purse, no scrip they bear with them
But cheerfully they start
To cross the plains a thousand miles
And draw with them a cart.
Ye nations list, the men of God
From Zion now they come
Clothed with the priesthood and the power
To gather Israel home.

CHORUS

Then cheer up ye Elders,
You to the world will show
That Israel must be gathered soon
And oxen are too slow.

Ye pious men whose sympathy
Is touched for fallen men,
A pattern now is set for you,
Just beat it if you can:
Here's men who're called to go abroad
The Gospel to impart.
They leave their friends and homes so dear
And start with their handcart.

Now competition is the rage,
Throughout the world 'tis true,
To head the Mormons they must rise
Far earlier than they do.
For Mormonism it is sound,

Some folks would ask, Why do you start With carts, come tell I pray?

We answer: When our Prophet speaks,

EXERPTS TAKEN FROM THE LIFE HISTORY OF MARYJANE MILLER HILL WIFE OF ISAAC HILL

(Written by her granddaughter, Stella Johnson Mackelprang, daughter of Elizabeth Hill Cook and Chriss Johnson)

In September 1864, Mary Jane and her husband Isaac received a call from President Brigham Young to go and help settle the Bear Lake region (St. Charles) in Idaho. The trials and hardships they had to endure while living in Salt Lake City were nothing in comparison with what they met up with in this new territory...

Isaac and the young boys had only time enough to get the logs hauled and to build one room before the heavy snow fall and it was so deep they were unable to haul more logs with which to build more rooms...(Some of the family had to sleep out in the wagon boxes) The weather was so cold that the temperature fell to 40 degrees below zero...

About February when the lake (Bear lake) was frozen over two men from the east came to the New Territory and cut holes in the ice and fished and caught a lot of fish...after learning how it was done Mary Jane would go down on the lake nearly every day and fish and catch enough for the family to eat...As Isaac had been subjected to severe spells of rheumatism and arthritis. for years he could not stand the exposure of the cold and being on the ice.

The next summer there came another cricket (or grasshopper) plague similar to the one that had infested Salt Lake City while they were living there and what few crops Isaac and the boys did get planted were nearly all destroyed by those pests...

They didn't have much better prospects that next winter... Isaac was afflicted so much with another spell of rheumatism during that summer he was unable to make the trip to Cash Valley as planned... to get...provisions for their winter use... they did have milk and butter to use... as soon as

the lake was frozen over they cut holes in the ice and fished...

(In 1874)...they moved six miles south to Fish Haven, Idaho...Isaac had been afflicted with rheumatism and arthritis for many years and finally became so lame he had to walk with a cane. However, he used to walk one mile to George Town on "Fast Days" to bear his testimony to the truthfulness of the gospel of Latter-day- Saints. He died 25 June 1879 at Fish Haven, Idaho, and was taken to St. Charles for burial.
