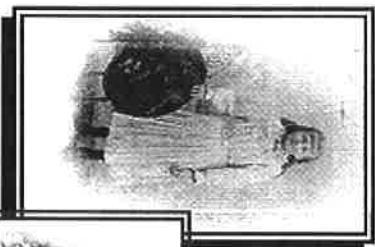

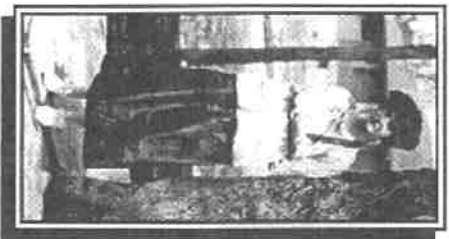
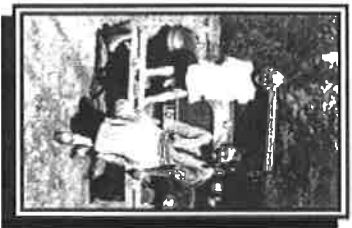

JOHN EDWARD JONES, born January 11, 1879, in Woodland, Summit County, Utah was the second of nine children born to Elisha Allen Jones and Eliza Catherine Thayne. He married Emelia Matilda Bott September 14, 1904 in the Manti Temple. With loving hearts, they welcomed into their home a daughter, Velda Mae, born May 3, 1920, who is the author of the following tribute:

### A PORTRAIT OF MY DAD

Our home was a humble dwelling. It was held together by the love of a sensitive and caring man. Visualize a slight-built man, a touch of gray in his dark brown hair, with brown eyes that shone with kindness and love.

The role of father, mother, housekeeper, provider, friend, and advisor was a challenge to him when he was left to care for an eleven-year old daughter. He met this challenge bravely and with a lonely heart. At times he must have had doubts about this new responsibility.

It has been said a daughter loved has many names. His favorite names for me were "Sister" and "Dolly." They were both endearing names that I answered to all my life.

He learned a livelihood first by helping on the family brickyard making bricks for use in various building projects. Later he was employed as a miner at Warris. After returning to Castle Dale he farmed and ran a small herd of sheep in "the Breaks."

He had a bay-colored team of horses and a saddle horse named "Croppy" that Mother and Dad rode. The tips of the ears were gone from the saddle horse, hence the name "Croppy."

This soft-spoken man had many friends, and a special relationship with the young and old members of his brother's families. He would lend the fellows money for dance tickets, and he enjoyed them coming by in the evening and visiting and having a "bit to eat." His favorite – coffee and cake or cookies. He was affectionately called "Uncle Johnny" by nieces and nephews.

Although he wasn't born with a singing voice, he enjoyed music. He always encouraged me to practice and continue on with my piano lessons. He was happy to have others come to our home to practice while I played for them. In the evenings he welcomed his sister, Ida; brothers Herb, Merve, and brother-in-law Alva, and sometimes another brother, Wallace, for a sing-a-long. They were known as the Jones Quartette. Their

harmony was so natural, with each one singing a part, and often alternating parts. It was a happy and joyous time. Dad was always the avid listener and true supporter as they performed at various functions.

Dad cut quite a figure on the dance floor. He was graceful and loved to dance the Scottish Quadrille, heel and toe polka, and his favorite, the waltz. There was a "caller" for these dances of the era, and Dad knew all the intricate steps. His favorite songs were: "I'll Take You Home Again Kathleen," "In the Garden," and "On the Banks of the Wabash."

Although he seldom spoke of my school achievements, he was proud of my accomplishments, and ready to tell anyone about them. He loved to hear me play the piano.

His love and attention to his grandchildren was unequalled. His daily visit, and his help and advice were welcomed. Each grandchild was special to him. Our "suppers" of hot cakes and the trimmings at his home was a special occasion.

He was always supportive and helpful to Ralph in all that he did. He learned to love and respect him for his hard work and the way he cared for our family, as well as the love and care that Ralph gave to him.

His favorite foods were hot cakes, ham and eggs, smoked salmon, sardines, steak and potatoes and gravy, pickles, carrot pudding, hot biscuits, and a variety of pies. Mince-meat pie was a family favorite.

He smoked cigarettes from an early age. He often rolled his own, and in later years smoked a pipe. Price Albert was his favorite tobacco. Bull Durham was commonly used. His death was attributed to this habit. For six months before his death he gave up smoking.

He did not attend church, but supported his wife and daughter in their church activities. He was a charitable man, sharing his food and funds with those less fortunate. He was quick to say, "Now don't tell anyone about this," when he would take food-stuffs to some family in need.

He was loved as a Dad, father-in-law, granddad, and by those who knew this special man. He will always be in our hearts and memories.

I am sure that in heaven there are two very special spirits who are smiling and beaming with pride as they see the beautiful faces of their posterity.

## EMELIA MATILDA BOTT JONES

Karl Christian Bott and Maria Katharina Epple lived in a beautiful countryside in Hochdorf, Donau, Wuerttemberg, Germany not far from the Danube River. This small town, where you might see someone bringing in a herd of geese for the evening, had only fifteen houses. For warmth, the houses were built over the stables where the animals were kept. They carried their clothes to the river where they washed them.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Days Saints was not accepted very well, and oftentimes missionaries were sent to jail. The chances seem so slim that missionaries would find this family in such a remote area. Karl and Maria, having lost a baby daughter, came with their three other children, Karl Christian, Maria Christine (Mary), and Gottlob Paul Eberhardt, to America about 1880 as converts to the Church. They were first sent to Lehi by the Church and then to the Price area, with a population of approximately 300. They were very patriotic and respected the flag of the United States. They were known as very stalwart, honest, and brave people. It was in Price their youngest daughter, Emelia Matilda, was born, October 20, 1886.

Emelia had very little chance to know her father, as he passed away September 8, 1888, at the age of thirty-eight, and was buried in Price. He had been grubbing sage brush, and died of pneumonia.

Her mother, Maria, married Charles Young, who was a Section Foreman on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. Their marriage lasted only a short time.

The citizens of Price, which was a part of Emery County at the time, desired to incorporate and form a town, and Maria Katharina's name along with her four children's names are on the attached document, dated March 26, 1894.

After Maria's divorce she moved with her four children to Castle Dale. They were very destitute and lived in one room, with the kitchen being a lean-to added on.

She later married John Schultheiss, and they too divorced. He deeded Block 29 to her son, Carl Christian, who later gave the northwest corner to Warren E. And Pearl Bott Barton.

Maria died of consumption December 27, 1899, and was buried in the Castle Dale Cemetery, when Emelia was only thirteen year old. Emelia made her home with her brother Carl, and wife Stena, until her marriage to John Edward Jones, September 14, 1904, at age 18.

(As told to me, Joyce Miya, in 1996, by Boyd Bott, Grandma Emelia's cousin) "Your Grandma Millie was a very attractive girl, a very beautiful girl, a very popular girl. She was dating Ivan Wall, a brother-in-law to your Mom's Aunt Ida (Alva) Wall. Now Mother and Dad and everybody was hoping she'd marry Ivan Wall. But, your Granddad, he had a beautiful voice and he could sing. I don't know, but I imagine some of them were love songs. So poor old Ivan walked out." Boyd, with his rare sense of humor, continued, "This is only 'my' story of what happened."

Boyd continued with a story about Granddad Jones. "One day he was down at our place. He reached into one pocket then another looking for something, and finally exclaimed, 'Where's my to-bac-co?' He always smoked and rolled his own cigarettes."

"Your Grandma Millie was an intelligent person and a very likeable person. She was really outstanding. She was the most outstanding one, I think, in Dad's family. Everybody loved Millie. Everybody did. And she was always real good to me. I think that is why Uncle John was so quiet, because everyone was always talking to Aunt Millie, and fussing around her."

## CASTLE DALE MATRON DIES FROM WOUND RECEIVED JULY 12

Mrs. Emelie Matilda Jones, 44, wife of John E. Jones of Castle Dale, died last Friday morning, at 3 o'clock, in a Salt Lake hospital, from an injury received July 12, at their farm home. In the Breaks, when she jumped from a wagon, as the horses became frightened, and began to run away, breaking the bone of her leg, which pierced the flesh and protruded into the ground.

Infection developing in the wound was the cause of her death.

Emelie Bolt Jones was born October 20, 1886, in Pric, Utah. She was left an orphan at the age of 13, and was taken into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Peterson in Castle Dale, which was her home until the marriage of her brother, Carl to Stella Peterson, October 10, 1900, when she went to live with them.

She was married to John E. Jones September 14, 1904, in the Mantle Temple.

Mrs. Jones was an active worker in the P. U. M. W. and Sunday school at the L. D. S. church of this place, and will be sorely missed by the entire community.

She is survived by her husband, one daughter, Velda Mae Jones of Castle Dale, two brothers, Carl Bolt of Castle Dale, and Earl Bolt of Fos Angeles, and two sons, Mary Peterson of Park City and Castle Dale. The body was brought to Castle Dale, where funeral services were held last Monday at 4 P. M. in the parlour. Burial was in the Castle Dale cemetery.

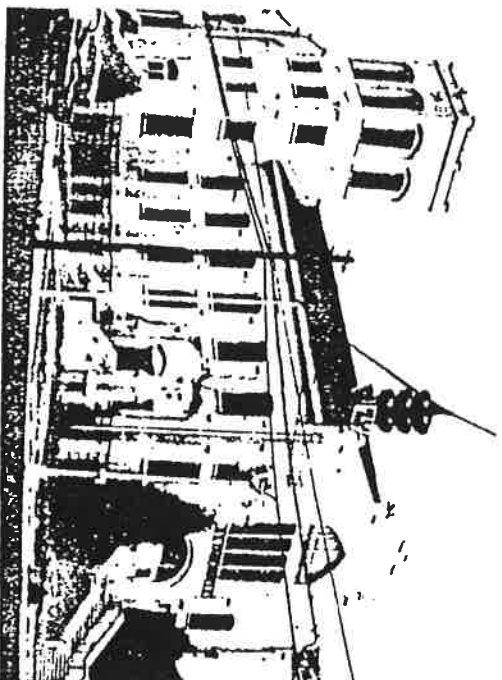
He was a miner in his early years, and worked in the "Brickyard." In later years he farmed and ran sheep in "the Breaks." He was a member of the L.D.S. Church.

To the Hon. The County Court of Emery County, Utah Territory

Gentlemen:

The undersigned your petitioners respectfully state, that we are a majority of the taxpayers of the town of Price in Emery County, Utah Territory and we reside within the boundaries of said town as hereinafter set forth. That said town has a population of more than three hundred residing within the boundaries hereinafter mentioned as shown by the census and affidavit hereinto attached and make "exhibit A" and has abundant resources with which to support a town corporation. That we desire to incorporate and organize a town under the name of Price and to embrace within its corporate limits the following described lands. The South half of the South east quarter of Section 16. The South half of the south west quarter of Section 16 (The same being school lands and not entered). The south east quarter of the south east quarter of Section 17 being desert land entry No. 1317. The East half of the north east quarter of Section 20 being apart of homestead entry 5300. The north half of Section 21 embracing a part of Homestead entry No. 5301 and all of cash lands entry No. 3065 all in Township 14 south of Range 10 East of the Salt Lake Meridian in Emery County, Utah Territory and all except the portion of Section 16 mentioned having been entered in the United States Land office at Salt Lake City, Utah. The boundaries of said town to be as follows: commencing at the south east corner of the north east quarter of Section 21 in the aforesaid township and Range and running then in North 240 rods more or less to the north east corner of the south east quarter of the south east quarter of Section 16. Thence west 400 rods more or less to the north west corner of the south east quarter of the south east quarter of said section 17. Thence south 240 rods more or less to the south west corner of the southeast quarter of the north east quarter of said section 20; thence east 400 rods more or less to the place of beginning.

Therefore; we hereby petition your Honorable body to declare the said town a body corporate and politic under the name and style of Price within boundry lines as hereinbefore set out and to that end you issue the necessary order in the premises respectfully;

## EMELIA MATILDA BOTT JONES

Karl Christian Bott and Maria Katharina Epple lived in a beautiful countryside in Hochdorf, Donau, Wuerttemberg, Germany not far from the Danube River. This small town, where you might see someone bringing in a herd of geese for the evening, had only fifteen houses. For warmth, the houses were built over the stables where the animals were kept. They carried their clothes to the river where they washed them.

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Maria died of consumption December 27, 1899, and was buried in the Castle Dale Cemetery, when Emelia was only thirteen year old. Emelia made her home with her brother Carl, and wife Stena, until her marriage to John Edward Jones, September 14, 1904, at age 18.

(As told to me, Joyce Myra, in 1996, by Boyd Bott, Grandma Emelia's cousin) "Your Grandma Millie was a very attractive girl, a very beautiful girl, a very popular girl. She was dating Ivan Wall, a brother-in-law to your Mom's Aunt Ida (Alva) Wall. Now Mother and Dad and everybody was hoping she'd marry Ivan Wall. But, your Granddad, he had a beautiful voice and he could sing. I don't know, but I imagine some of them were love songs. So poor old Ivan walked out." Boyd, with his rare sense of humor, continued, "This is only 'my' story of what happened."

Boyd continued with a story about Granddad Jones. "One day he was down at our place. He reached into one pocket then another looking for something, and finally exclaimed, 'Where's my to-bac-co?' He always smoked and rolled his own cigarettes."

"Your Grandma Millie was an intelligent person and a very likeable person. She was really outstanding. She was the most outstanding one, I think, in Dad's family. Everybody loved Millie. Everybody did. And she was always real good to me. I think that is why Uncle John was so quiet, because everyone was always talking to Aunt Millie, and fussing around her."

## CASTLE DALE MATRON DIES FROM WOUND RECEIVED JULY 12

Mrs. Emelie Matilda Jones, 44, wife of John E. Jones of Castle Dale, died last Friday morning, at 3 o'clock, in a Salt Lake hospital, from an injury received July 12, at their farm home, in the Breaks, when she jumped from a wagon as the horses became frightened and began to run away, breaking the bone of her leg which pierced the flesh and protruded into the ground.

Infection developing in the wound was the cause of her death.

Emelie Gott Jones was born October 20, 1888, in Price, Utah. She was left an orphan at the age of 13, and was taken into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Peterson in Castle Dale, which was her home until the marriage of her brother, Carl to Stena Peterson, October 10, 1900, when she went to live with them.

She was married to John E. Jones September 14, 1904, in the Mantle Temple.

Mrs. Jones was an active worker in the Primary and Sunday school of the L. D. S. church, of this place, and will be sorely missed by the entire community.

She is survived by her husband, one daughter, Velda Mae Jones, of Castle Dale, two brothers, Carl Gott of Castle Dale and John Gott of Los Angeles, and a sister, Mrs. Mary Peterson of Park City.

The body was brought to Castle Dale, where funeral services were held last Monday at 4 p. m.
