Ugh it was coal, it was heated by coal, and it was a pretty nice A j: Well it was owned by the company, ugh rent was really cheap, it was something like

But it was a really nice town, peaceful. enjoyable town, the population was something like ugh less than 200 people at the time I lived peaceful, and enjoyable, we grew up with a lot of discipline though, and ugh it was quite A J: Well it was a small town, wasn't very many families there at the time, ugh it was quite Tyra: Alright, what do you remember about the town or community where you grew up?
