Shiann: (laughs)

Paulyte: So, that's how I got my nickname.

Shiann: oh... do they still call you by your nickname?

Paulyte: yes, they do.

Shiann: ok, alright, um, right now where do you live?

Paulyte: I live in Huntington.

Shiann: Um, have you ever lived anywhere else?

Paulyte: uh, yes I have. I've lived in Washington, D.C., and San Antonio, Texas, And Salt

Lake City, and Price, Utah, and Orem, Utah, Las Vegas, (pause) Nevada, and here. Most

of it I've spent here.
