The **first part** is a Descendancy Chart of the descendants of Robert and Blanche Wayman that shows the relationship of all of us to each other.

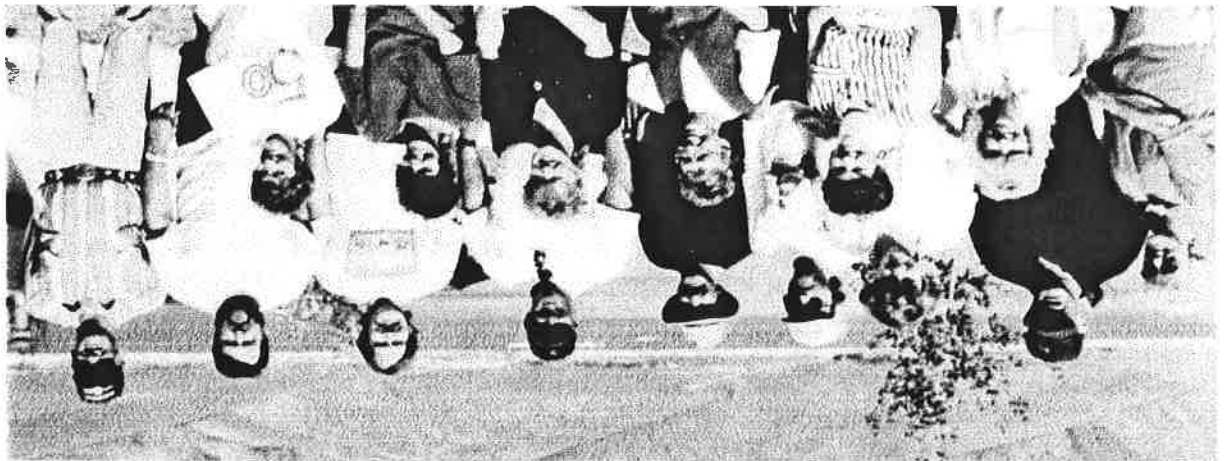

Memories of Home

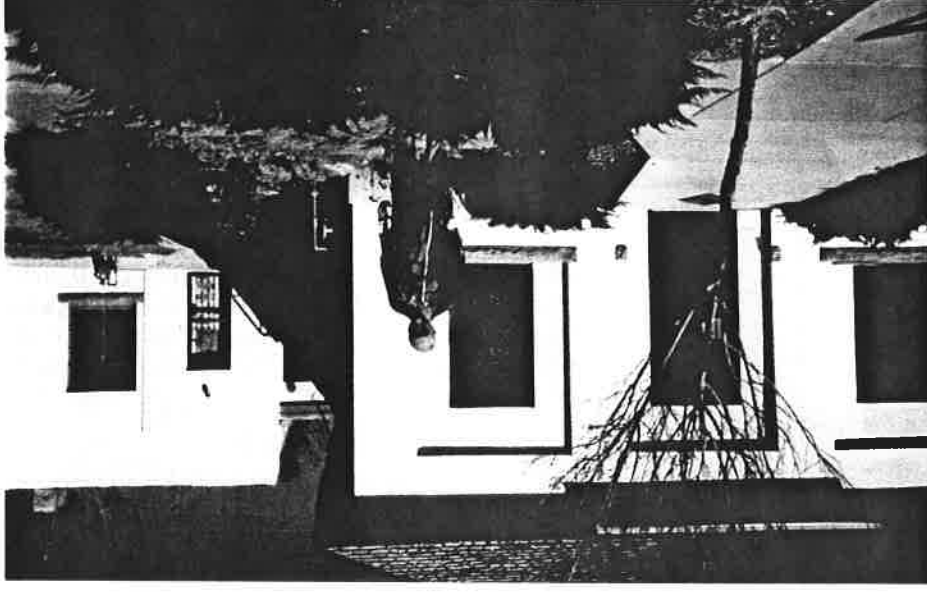
I think of them there in the twilight

To our old home, and Father and Mother.

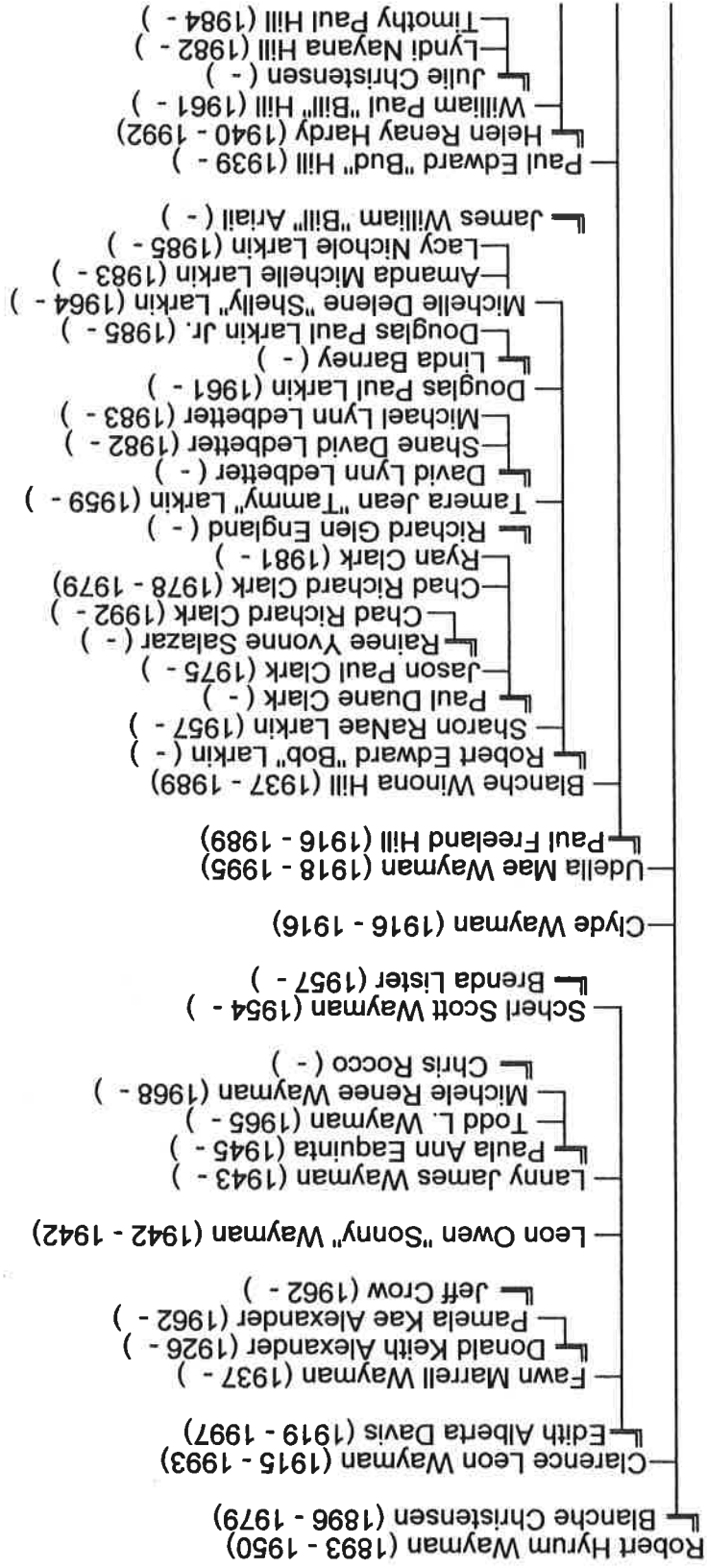


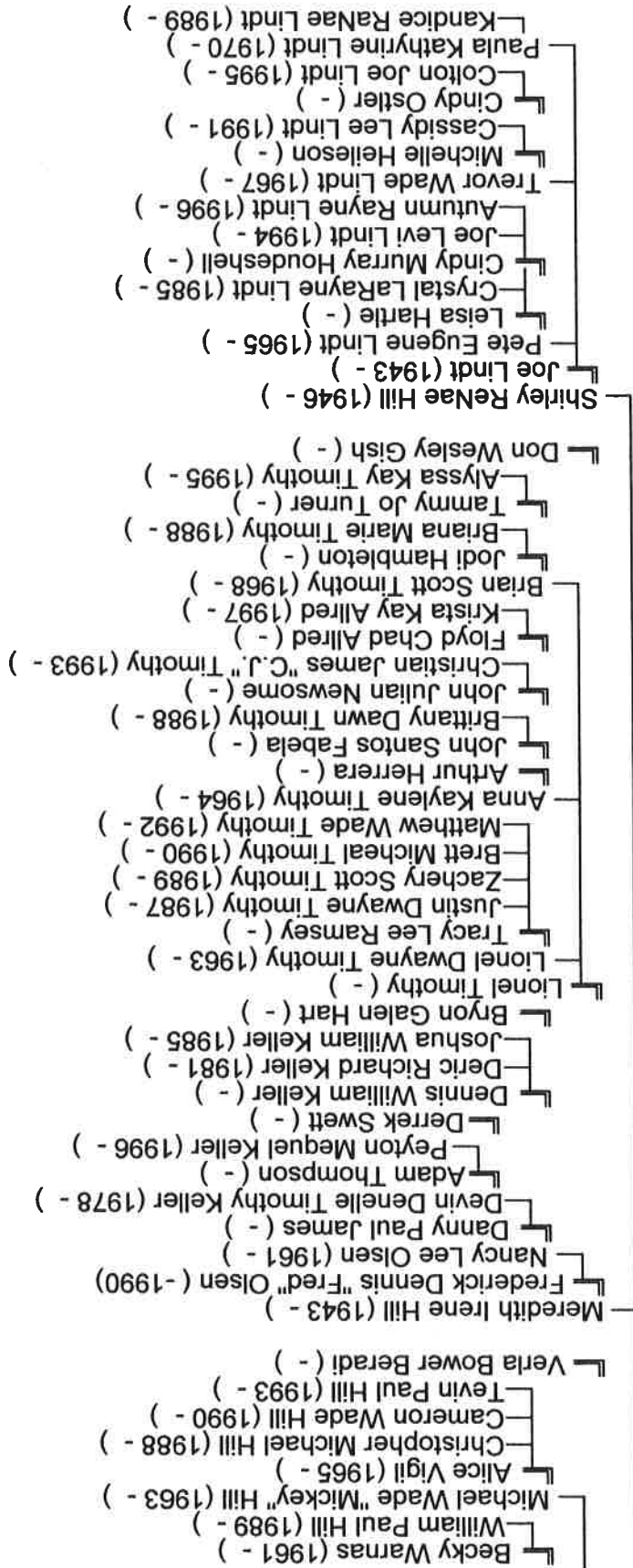
Max in front of old family home in Castle Dale, summer 1996

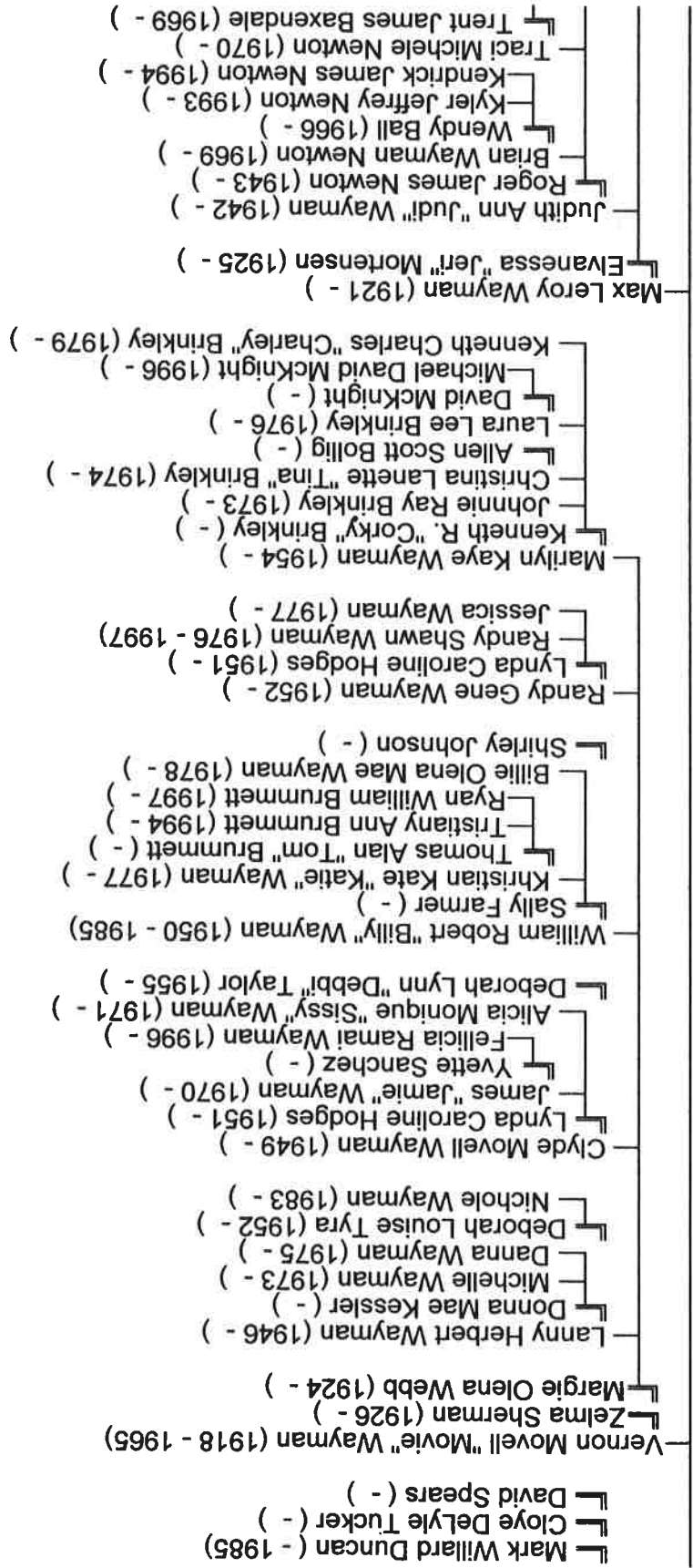


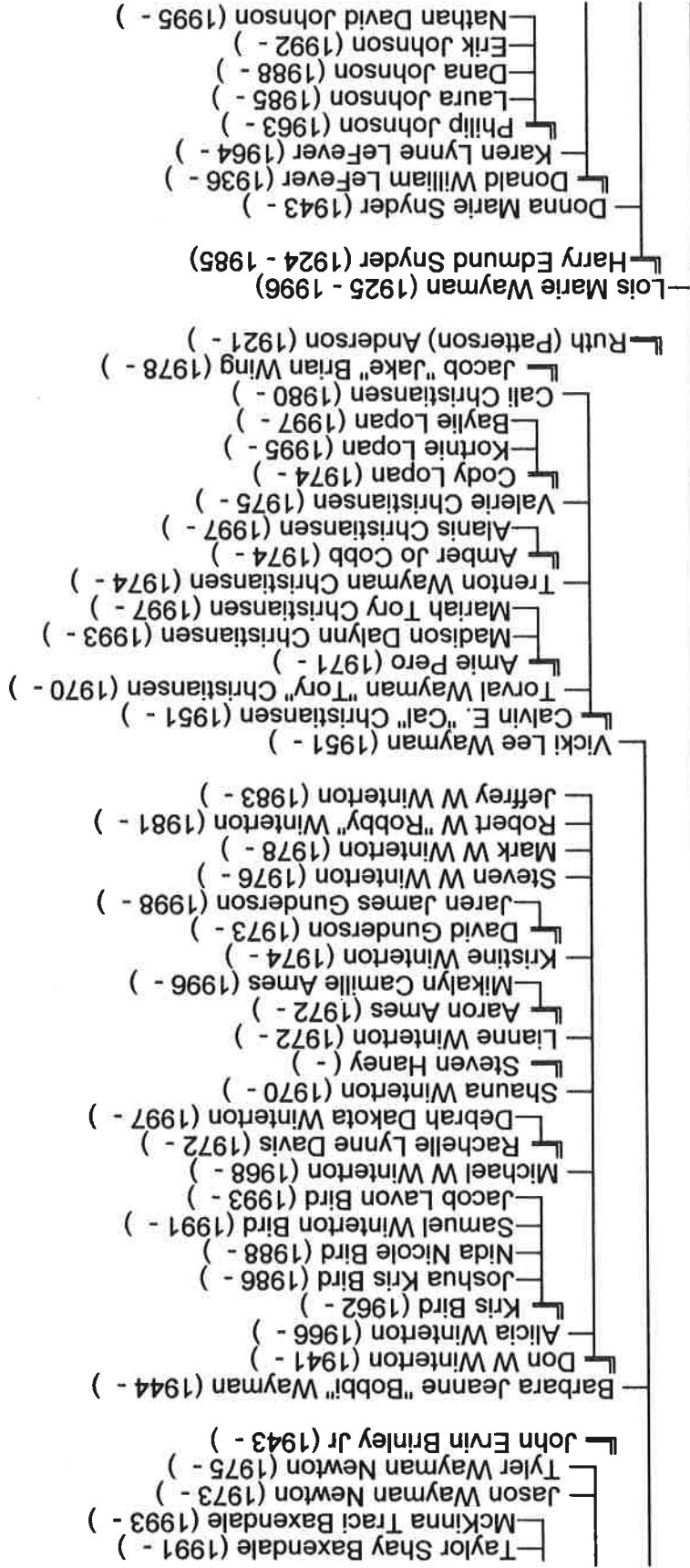

summer 1939

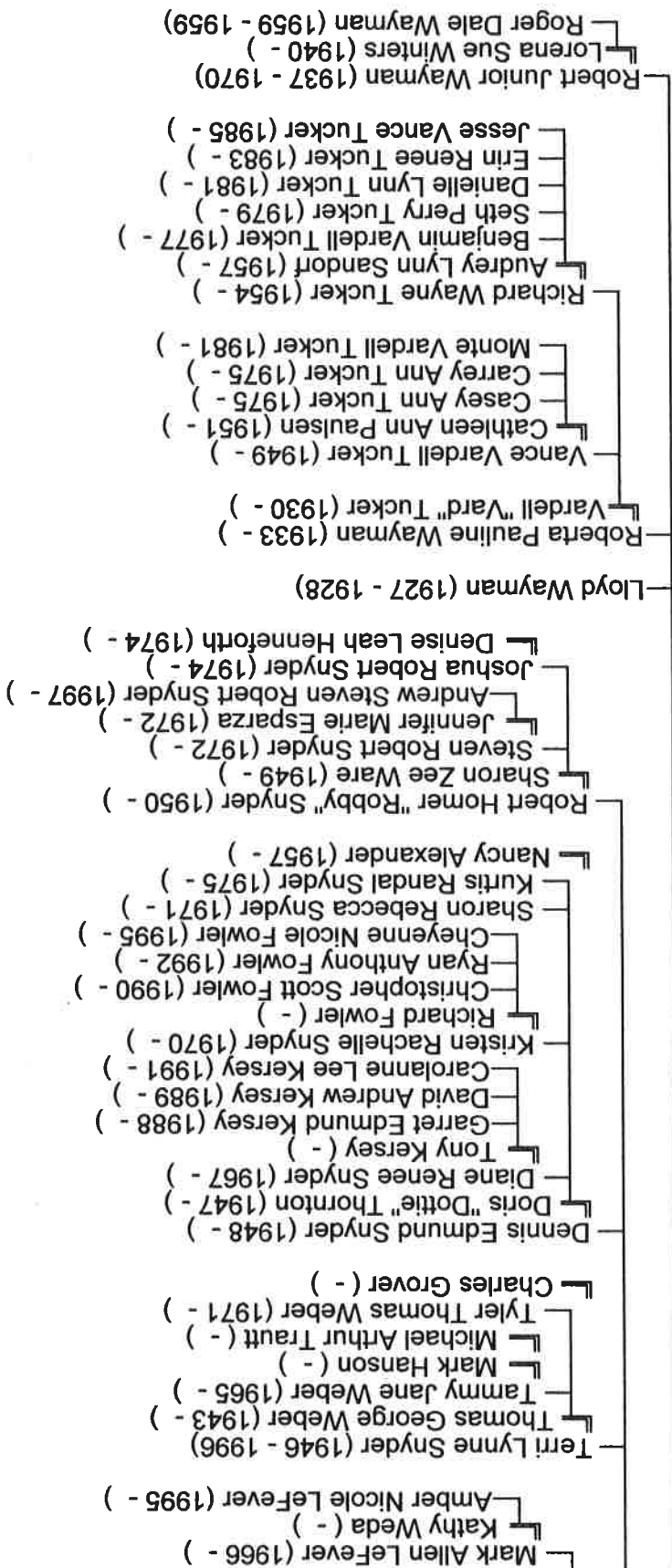

Robert and Blanche Wayman

Robert Hyrum' Wayman, son of Charles Emmanuel Wayman and Martha Elizabeth Stoddard, was born in Molen, Emery County, Utah, USA, 6 February 1893. Know as Robb. He died 8 April 1950 in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, at 57 years of age. He was buried 11 April 1950 in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA.

He married Blanche' Christensen, daughter of Dr. Paul Christian Christensen and Josephine Larsen, in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 2 July 1914. Blanche was born in Orangeville, Emery County, Utah, USA, 15 February 1896. (Many years after Robert's death she married James Bert Reynolds after 1956.) Blanche died 10 January 1979 in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, at 82 years of age. She was buried in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA.

At 22 years of age Robert became the father of Clarence Leon Wayman in Ferron, Emery County, Utah, USA, 5 May 1915.

At 23 years of age Robert became the father of Clyde Wayman in Ferron, Emery County, Utah, USA, 7 December 1916.

At 25 years of age Robert became the father of Udella Mae Wayman and Vernon Movell Wayman in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 1 July 1918.

At 28 years of age became Robert the father of Max Leroy Wayman in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 4 August 1921.

At 32 years of age Robert became the father of Lois Marie Wayman in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 1 April 1925.

At 34 years of age Robert became the father of Lloyd Wayman in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 9 June 1927.

At 39 years of age Robert became the father of Roberta Pauline Wayman in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 3 January 1933.

At 44 years of age Robert became the father of Robert Junior Wayman in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 11 September 1937.

Robert was baptized a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints 7 July 1901. He was endowed 26 February 1953 in the Manti Temple. Robert and Blanche Christensen were sealed in the Manti Temple, 15 November 1954. Clyde, Lloyd, and Robert Junior were sealed to Robert and Blanche Christensen 15 November 1954 in the Manti Temple. Clarence Leon and Max Leroy were sealed to Robert and Blanche Christensen 26 June 1965 in the Manti Temple. Vernon Movell was sealed to Robert and Blanche Christensen 8 February 1967 in the Manti Temple. Roberta Pauline was sealed to Robert and Blanche Christensen 20 January 1973 in the Los Angeles Temple. Udella Mae was sealed to Robert and Blanche Christensen 8 May 1998 in the Los Angeles Temple.

Clarence Leon Wayman Family

Clarence Leon² Wayman (Robert Hyrum¹) was born in Ferron, Emery County, Utah, USA, 5 May 1915. He was known as Leon in the family. He died 29 April 1993 in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, at 77 years of age and was buried 1 May 1993 in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA.

He married Edith Alberta Davis in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 16 March 1935. Edith was born in Springville, Utah County, Utah, USA 4 February 1919. Edith died 13 April 1997 in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, at 78 years of age. She was buried 17 April 1997 in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA.

At 22 years of age Leon became the father of Fawn Marcell Wayman in Spring Canyon, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 11 September 1937.

At 27 years of age Leon became the father of Leon Owen 'Sonny' Wayman in Standardville, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 31 July 1942. He died 2 November 1942; he is buried in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA.

At 28 years of age Leon became the father of Lanny James Wayman in Standardville, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 28 October 1943.

At 39 years of age Leon became the father of Scherl Scott Wayman in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 6 October 1954.

Leon was baptized a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Castle Dale, Emery County, Utah, USA, 25 September 1926. He was endowed in the Mantt Temple, 18 July 1964. Leon and Edith were sealed in the Mantt Temple, 18 July 1964.

Fawn Marcell³ Wayman (Clarence Leon², Robert Hyrum¹) was born in Spring Canyon, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 13 September 1937. She married Donald Keith Alexander in Price, Carbon County, Utah, USA, 1 November 1958. He is know as Keith to the family. Keith was born 30 March 1926 and is the son of Robert Alexander.

At 24 years of age Fawn became the mother of Pamela Kae Alexander in Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, Utah, USA, 5 June 1962.

Fawn was baptized a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, 29 March 1949.

Robert rode back and forth from Ferron to Castle Dale to see Blanche. They rode

horseback to see things, go places and to spend time together. It was such fun! There were no cars, that didn't matter they weren't used to them and they didn't miss them anyway.

They were married, 2 July 1914 at Castle Dale by Richard C. Miller, J.P. It was a modest affair with only family members at a delicious Wedding Dinner. They moved into her parent's garage... Leon was born in Castle Dale before they moved to Ferron to live in the old Luther Burdick home on the Bench Road northeast of Ferron Town, owned by his brother, Emmanuel.

Rob worked for Wm. Killpack, a near neighbor, farming, hauling hay, etc. Anything to earn an honest dollar for his family. He worked hard, loved nature, enjoyed farming, herded and sheared sheep etc. Their second son Clyde was born here at Ferron, 7 December 1916. The older children went to school and grew up in Castle Dale. Married and have families and grandchildren. Have good jobs, made good money. Little Bert and his Dad grew very close in Rob's last days in this life. See Bert's story. After Blanche's Dad died they moved into his home, on Main Street where he had maintained his Dental Office. Rob was living here at the time of his death.

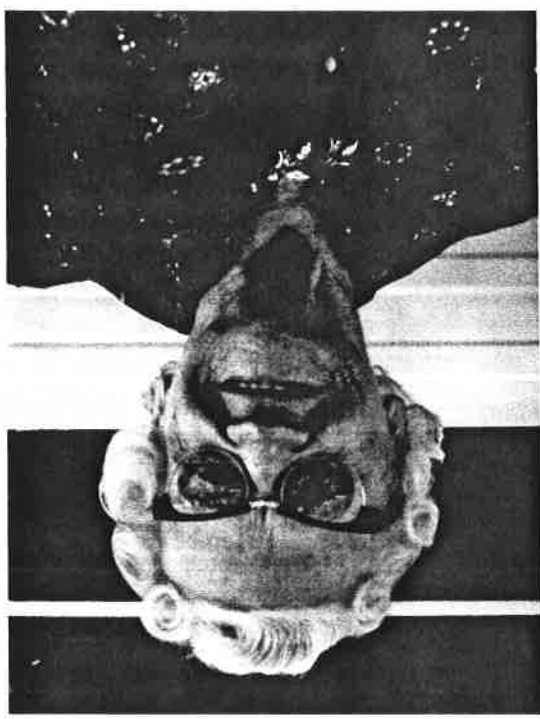

they had beef to eat, but they sometimes they had venison, rabbits and they raised their own pork. They raised a large garden and had a berry patch that consisted of raspberries, red currents and gooseberries. They had a ice house to keep the milk cool and to make homemade ice cream. The only cash money that came in was from Grandpa Wayman who would haul coal and sell wood and in the winter he would cut down Christmas trees and sale them. The price 25 cents each. Also for a few months in the Spring, he would shear sheep.

Her husband was taken from her April 8, 1950. She lived another 29 years without him. Two more of her children were taken from her as adults: Bert and Movie.

She suffered many illnesses and afflictions through out her life. As a young child she had a touch of polio (which left her hips stiff). In 1938 she had a blister on her toe which turned to blood poisoning - the infection was so painful that the slightest movement caused her to scream. The washing machine had to be moved outside by the tree because the vibration caused her to scream. Also the vibration of trucks and cars driving by the home caused her to scream. As a result of this illness, she wore a special built up shoe for over 40

Clarence Leon Wayman, born May 5, 1915, Castle Dale, Emery County. He was the eldest of nine children, born to Hyrum Robert and Blanche Christensen Wayman.



His early years were spent in Castle Dale. He liked to hunt and fish when ever time could be taken away from

raised during the depression and learned how to work hard and make do with what she had, and she followed that philosophy her whole life.

At the age of 16, she met a tall, good looking young man from Castle Dale named Leon Wayman. They were married March 16, 1935 by Mr. Wallace, the town undertaker. They did this on the spur of the moment and were not eager to tell their parents until several days later. But that marriage lasted 58 years.

As newlyweds, they lived in a two room house in Spring Canyon, where Leon worked in the coal mine and Edith worked in the home. Two years later, Fawn was born, and they both loved their adorable, redheaded little girl.

They soon bought a shell of a house which they moved to Price, and began working on it to make it a home. Edith cooked on a coal stove, hauled water from the cistern, and washed clothes on a washboard. Life was hard back then, but it was also good. Then tragedy struck their young lives. In 1942, within 3 short months, they experienced joy in the birth of a son and despair in returning him to the arms of his Heavenly Father. His name was Leon Owen but they called him "Sonny."

I feel very blessed to have a family such as ours, who are not only related by blood but by friendship as well. Such is the case with Aunt Edith - not only was she one of my favorite Aunts, she was also a very dear friend, and I'll miss both friend and Aunt.

It's an honor to be standing here this morning, sharing my thoughts and feelings with you about Aunt Edith. I know I won't be able to cover everything, because there were many facets to her personality, but maybe some of my thoughts will mingle with those of yours and, together, we'll bid a fond farewell to a little lady with a big heart.



Edith was born in Springville on February 4, 1919, the eldest child of six children. Most of her young life was spent in Spring Canyon, where her father worked as a coal miner, and she was happy with mountains to climb and homemade toys to play with. When her dad was injured and could no longer work, there were times when their only source of food was fish that he had caught and parsnips from a relative's garden. You'd think that a lady the size of "Little Bit" would have a weak and tiny voice, but not Aunt Edith. We could hear her no matter where we were, especially if

though it was very hard for her to find something womanly that was small enough for her - she almost had to shop in the children's department to find something to fit her well. We loved to wear her highest heels and parade around the house wearing her clothes and feeling like movie stars. That was very long ago and lasted such a short time, for before we knew it we had outgrown all of Aunt Edith's shoes and clothes.



Aunt Edith was one of the littlest ladies I know - even when I was little, and it's pretty hard for me to remember when I was ever little, Aunt Edith was little. I remember Irene and I racing into the house when we went to visit and heading straight for her closet and her shoes. She loved to shop for shoes and she had a whole closet full to choose from, even

rate and beautiful, she makes it little - little dewdrops, little snowflakes, little diamonds, and little pearls.

Life is made up of a lot of "littles." Day is made up of little sunbeams, and night is glorious with little twinkling stars. Their family was complete with the birth of another son, Scherl. He was so cute and sweet, and quickly became the light of Edith's life.

It seemed like mom and dad and Edith and Leon were inseparable. Wherever we went or whatever we did, it was usually as a family. We were either eating at their house or they were at ours. We picnicked together, hunted and fished together, and took Sunday drives together.

As we grew up and had homes of our own, that feeling of closeness never changed. Aunt Edith asked me one time why I always invited them to every function I planned and it really took me by surprise. The only answer I could give her was "because you're here." It was so natural to include them in everything, I never gave it a second thought. To me, they were an extension of my parents. We seemed to do everything as a family unit. We took vacations together - whether it was camping or traveling across the United States to visit Dad's relatives in West Virginia and Florida, wherever you saw Mom and Dad, most likely, you also saw Uncle Leon and Aunt Edith. Together, they were charter members of the Buckhorn Travelers, which is part of the Good Sam's Club. As Buckhorn Travelers, they continued their togetherness with trips around Utah and the country.

My "Little Bit" always felt she had to look after me, and she never thought twice about giving me her "little bit" of advice, either. Without fail, every time I talked to her I received the same lecture: "You work too hard, you need to stop and smell the roses, and my favorite - you better slow down, girl, or you'll end up sick and then where will you be."

she was trying to get Irene and Lanny to stop making so much noise because they picked on each other so much and acted more like siblings than cousins.

Aunt Edith didn't have what you'd call a weak disposition, either. She was pretty feisty when she wanted to be - kind of like a little Banti hen that may be little, but you don't dare mess with it. One incident I recall, happened when I was around 9 or 10. Mom had a rule that whenever we were visiting someone and they asked us to eat with them, we were not to say yes until we looked at her to see if it was okay because she wouldn't eat if she felt there wasn't enough for everyone. Aunt Edith went along with this rule for as long as she could and one day she couldn't control herself any longer. She asked, in her usual way, "have you et?" When Irene and I looked at mom to see which way her head was shaking, Aunt Edith hit the table with the spoon she was holding, put both hands on her hips and said in a very loud voice, "You look at me, not your mother, and answer me - have you et yet?" Put in the middle, between these two feisty women was more than Irene and I wanted to deal with - but mom started laughing and we ended up eating with them. After that mom and Aunt Edith must have come to an understanding, because I don't remember feeling like I had to look for mom's consent before saying yes to all the tasty things she made, like pies and carrot cake and puddings. She always had a homemade dessert on hand for company, because everyone just naturally congregated there. That was because her home was always open to friends and relatives and she made everyone feel welcome. A favorite place to sit was outside under the apple tree.

She always worried about me, just like mom did, so in a way, she really was an extension of my mom. When I was little, people would ask where I got my red hair and freckles, and I always said "from my Aunt Edith." She really got a kick out of that. A while back I visited Aunt Edith and she showed me one of the latest porcelain dolls she'd added to her collection. It was a pretty little doll with bright red curls and a purple dress. She told me it was one of her favorites and that it reminded her of me. When I looked at that doll and saw the beauty the artist had created, I thought how wonderful it would be to see myself through Aunt Edith's eyes - because she saw beauty in most everything.

Helen Renay Hardy was born February 11, 1940 to William Earl and Alberta

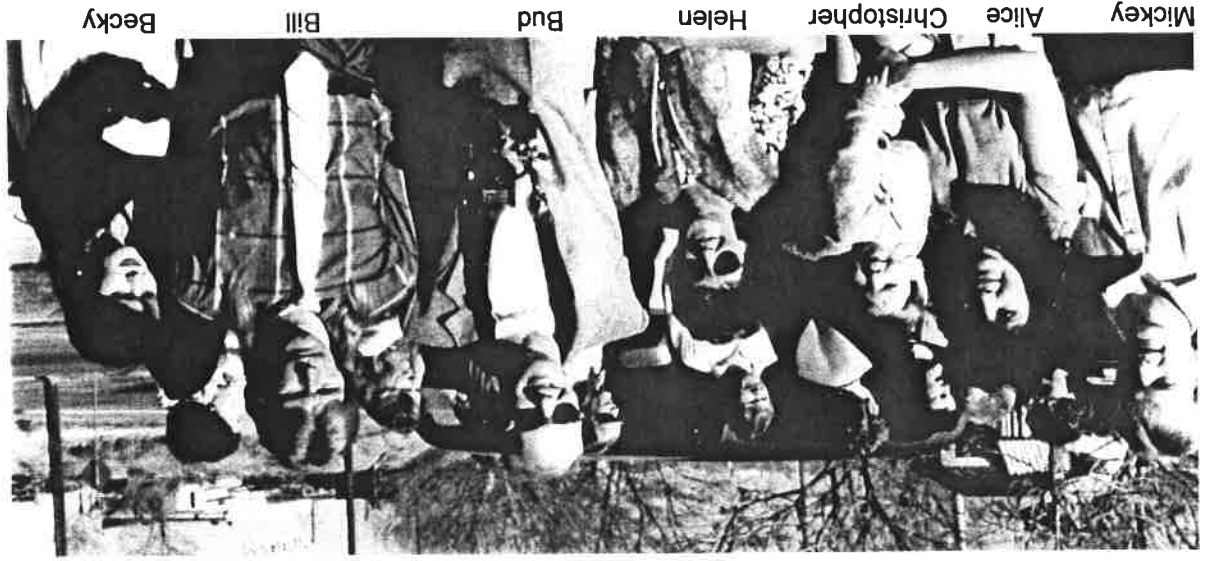
they lived in Long Beach again until his discharge in 1960.

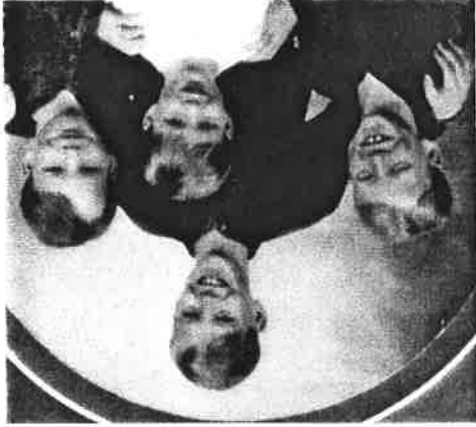

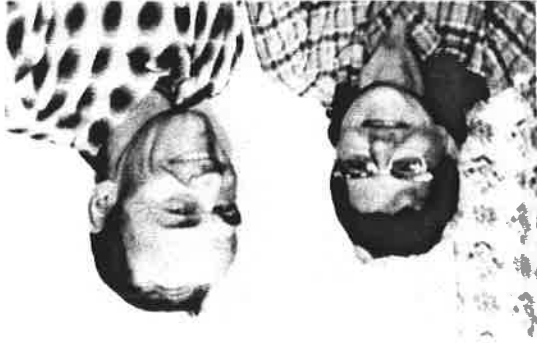

Most of their family still live in Dragerton.

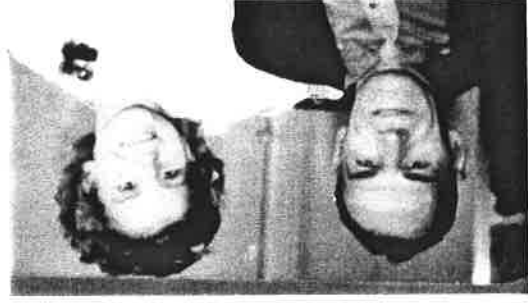

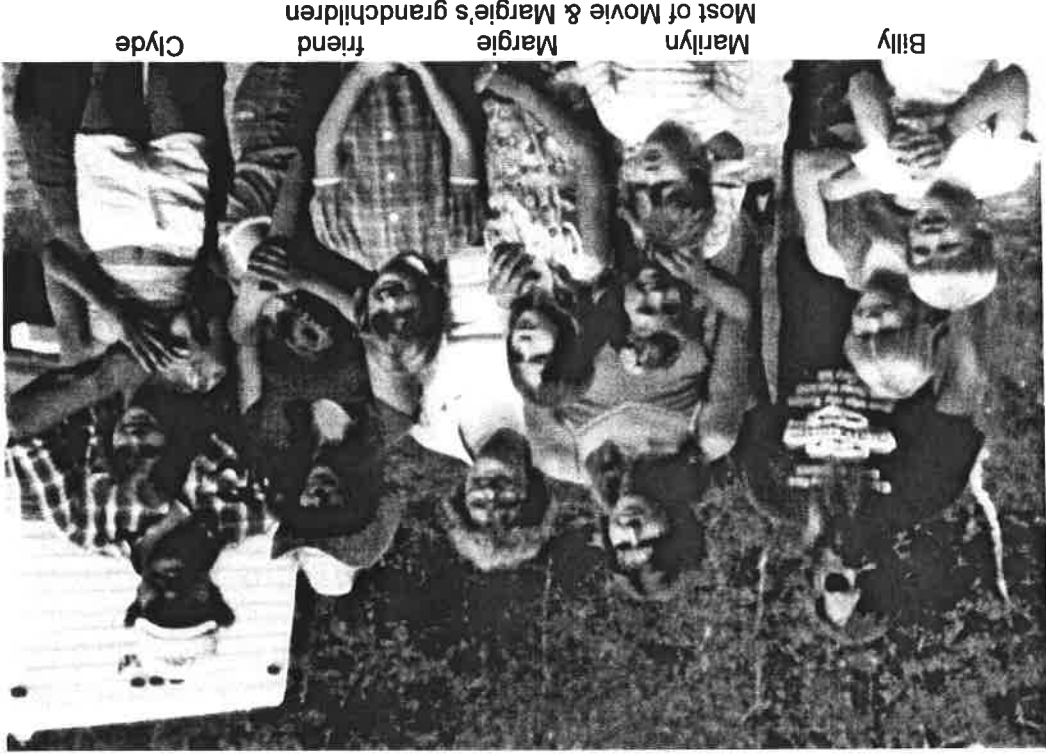


other sisters, Lois and Pauline, and brothers Leon, Max and Robert Jr. (Bert), and brothers Clyde and Lloyd died in infancy.

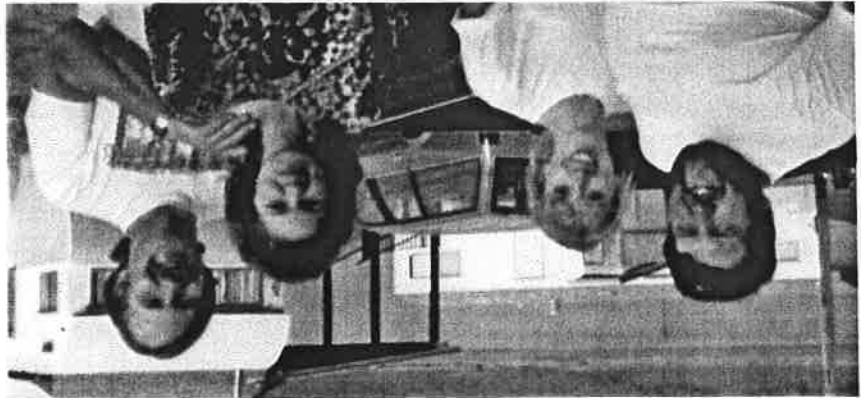

After leaving the CCC Camp, I worked with Dad loading coal in 1941 in Huntington Canyon. We hauled wood together from off the "wedge", which was East of Castle Dale.

I married Elvanessa Mortensen March 3, 1941 in Price, by Bishop Guyman. We had three girls; Judith Ann, Barbara Jeanne, and Vicki Lee. We have 15 grand children. I was later divorced. I married Ruth Patterson July 22, 1978.

I have worked at Castle Gate, Young's Construction, Kenilworth, Hiawatha, Horse Canyon, and presently working at Kaiser Steel for 30 years. My wife, Ruth, is Department Secretary for U.S. Steel and has been for 24 years. She has two children and five grandchildren.

Dad worked hard to try and support his family. He was strict and I was disciplined. Mom & Dad were compatible and we had a lot of love in our home. Dad passed away in 1950 from heart trouble, mainly pneumonia, his lungs were gone, and was determined a diabetic. He was 56 years old. Mother passed away in 1979 from hardening of the arteries, and heart. She was 83 years old.

I lived in Castle Dale until 1937 when I joined the "CCC" #959 Camp, stationed at Ferron, Utah, for 2 years, and later Vao, Utah, west of St. George for two months. Worked as a laborer for \$1.00 a day, \$30.00 per month. \$25.00 went home to my parents and I kept \$5.00. Movell, my brother, was in the same camp with me the last six months, so \$50 was sent home to our parents, which is all the money they had.

I cut ice from the Willberg Reservoir, and sold it during summer to people with ice boxes in the town of Castle Dale. It sold for 25cents per 100 lbs. I delivered the ice all over town in a wagon, pulled by a dog named Rover, that I had trained to pull the wagon.

Dad taught me how to shear sheep in the spring of 1940, and I sheared 11 head

One sport I remember doing as a child was playing ball with a pig bladder, we'd blow it up and play ball with it. I ran away from home once when I was 12 years old, me and my friend Duane Curtis went over to Paradise Ranch (about ten miles from home) where we stayed over night. Duane and I each rode our horses and took a quilt to sleep on, just because we 'didn't want to go to school.' We came home the next day.

About the age of 10 years old, I had to go to the hospital. I had been chasing my horse and was hit by a car, I suffered broken neck and broken leg. Also when I was 10, there was the first long trip I remember is our parents taking us to Mt. Pleasant in a Model T and visited relatives and this was the first time I ever seen Price, Utah. My transportation as a kid was walking, bike riding, or by horse. As I got older I had to earn the money to get an automobiles all by my self - I have bought all my cars myself. I learned to drive a car at the age of 11 or 12 years old it was in my brother Leon's Model-T Ford. When I grew up I always wanted to be a truck driver.



I was born August 4, 1921 in Castle Dale, Utah (in East Castle Dale) in the Sarah Anderson Home on Main Street. I was born of goodly parents: Hyrum Robert Wayman and Blanche Christensen. My Mother was 34 years old when she had me. I was the 5th child born to them. I have 8 brothers and sisters; a total of 9 children were born to my parents. I don't know who I was named after, but I looked like the Wayman side of the family.

My Father was born 6 February 1893 in Molen, Utah. My Mother was born 15th February 1896. I have a lot of respect and admiration for both my Mom and Dad. I looked up to my parents.

Growing up, my favorite toy was a little red wagon "we all received for Christmas" and it got used a lot. Later in life my favorite toy became a motorcycle. I have always owned a Harley-Davidson motorcycle. One of my loves in life is going on my motorcycle. I love fishing, hunting, camping, and all kinds of outdoor sports. If it wasn't snowmobiles, it was water skiing, and roughing it in the jeep in the Canyonlands on the Jeep Safari. I have always been a active person and I love my 'big man toys.'

As a child the only money I remember receiving was 15 cents at the 4th July to spend on candy (In those days eggs were 10 cents a dozen). Our July 4th's were going to Wilberg's and have picnics. Three or four families would go (Herman Bailey, Willard Miller, and The Seelys); we would all go all of us in 1½ ton stake truck.

As a little boy I loved fishing (I still do) and we also used to get under a street light and play 'run my shepie run' with all the "South town" kids and played 'andi over' the house.

My favorite pets were "Rover" my dog and "Dina" my first horse (the horse was a wild "desert" horse and I tamed it.). My best friend was Doyle Curtis who a little older than me and we'd go fishing and ride our horses; I also did a lot with my friend Jake Seely.

As a child, Christmas was special because Santa would come and bring presents. There was always a big fire at the square in the town of Castle Dale. I was given a special gift after I was grown up by Clarence Pilling who gave me a skinning knife.

One time I was crawling on top over the pig pen onto the chicken coup as my sister Lois and her friend Edna Ungritch were playing house and I was trying to watch them. I slipped and fell in the pig pen in the mess and the old boar pig rooted me all around. I was caught and ended up covered with bad, bad stuff.

I struggled in school and only went on and completed the 8th grade. My favorite class was history - I enjoyed learning about our country. My least favorite class was arithmetic. My very favorite teacher was Fred Reed; he took a interest in me. He was strict and still taught good. Had I been his student from the beginning, I would have finished school. I participated in school sports and loved basketball, baseball and boxing. A highlight of my school years was when we went on school trips to the desert and

I furnished the team and wagon for all of us to go.



I am a country and western music lover. When growing up the most popular dance step was the 'two-step' and I loved the radio programs the "Shadow" and "Grand Old Opera."

The naughtiest thing I ever did was I lied about my age so I could go into the CCC's [Civilian Conservation Corps]. I was only 15 years when I joined up with the CCC's. I joined so I could send \$25.00 a month home to my Mother and Father to live on (I was allowed to keep \$5.00 for myself). I was 18 when I completed the CCC's in the spring of 1940.

The girl I remember the most was Jeri Mortensen because she was my wife for 37 years. She was so tiny and cute and really good looking and a lot of fun to be with. I first met Jeri at the Show Hall in Price, Clarence Wayman (my cousin) introduced us. I was 19 years old. She even came to Mounds and watch me shear sheep. Our real first date was when we went to the band contest and carnival. Had so much fun - rode all the

go-er and a do-er. Two years ago we cruised to Alaska, last year we drove to Branson, and we're headed for Boston this fall.

I worked as a mechanic both underground and outside of the coal mines all my life and retired from Kaiser Steel in Sunnyside, Utah, after 35 years.

After Jeri and I divorced I married Ruth Anderson (Patterson). She and I have had a happy 20 years together.

Jeri and I had three special daughters Judi, Bobbi and Vicki. I am blessed with 17 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren. My most favorite periods



of my life, "the best times ever," were when I was a kid and growing up and also the time I got to watch my own kids grow up. They all turned out to be good kids. I love my daughters and my family with all my heart.

I would love to learn to golf and ski. My greatest unfilled ambition is to travel to England and Scotland to do genealogy and family history.

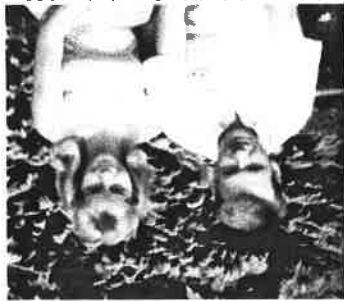

As a child I had a lot of illnesses and struggles with physical problems. These left me with a permanent hearing loss. 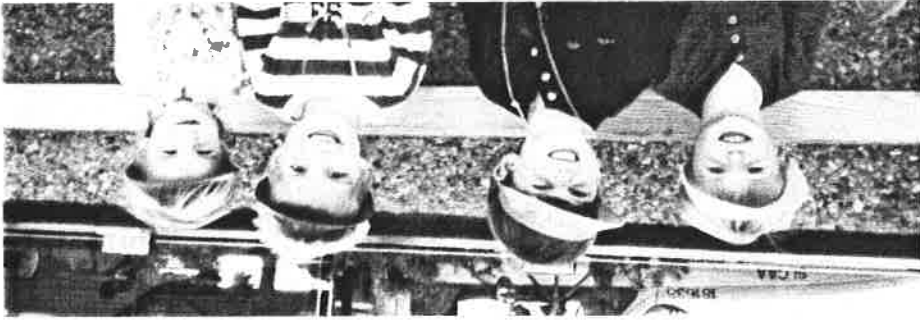

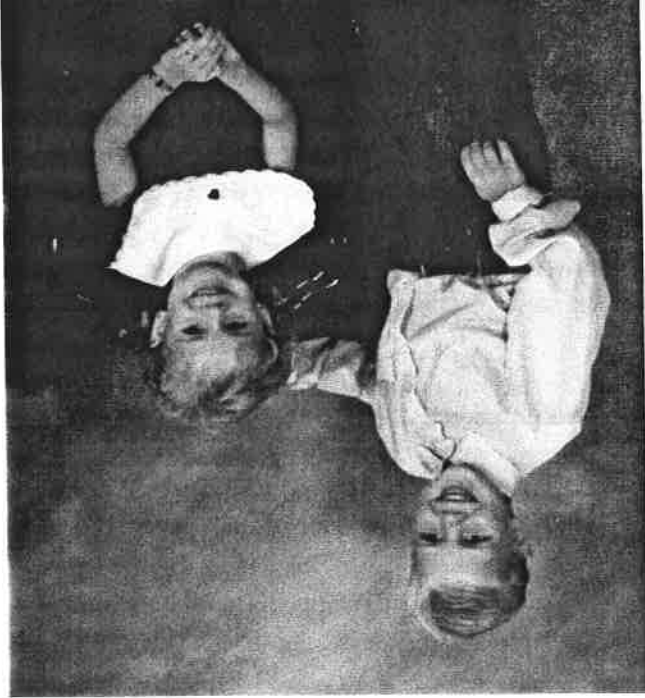

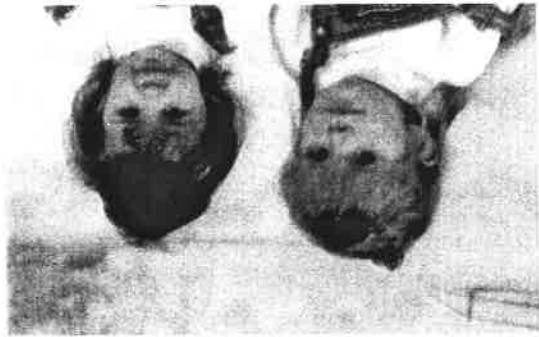
Kristine, our fourth daughter, who loves to be a listening ear for those with prob-

Cal and I love spending time together on our motorcycle, I guess I get that from my Dad. He's still riding his bike and we go riding together and really have a good time.

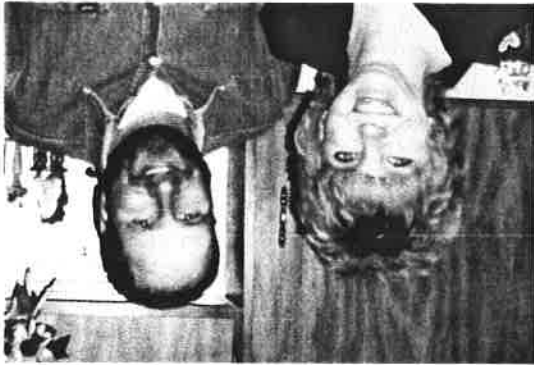

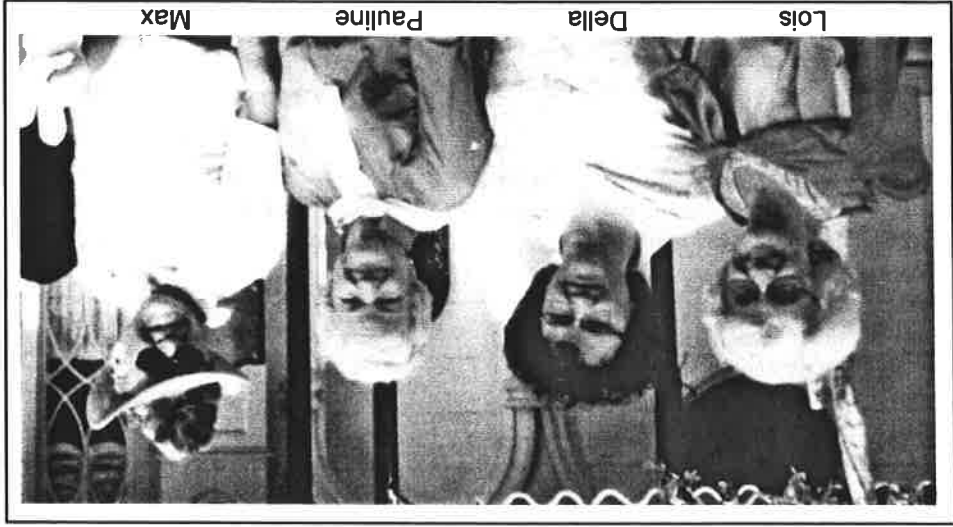
The work here is going well. We have been seeing a lot of blessings in the last week, for the branch here. Thank you all for everything. Love you all.

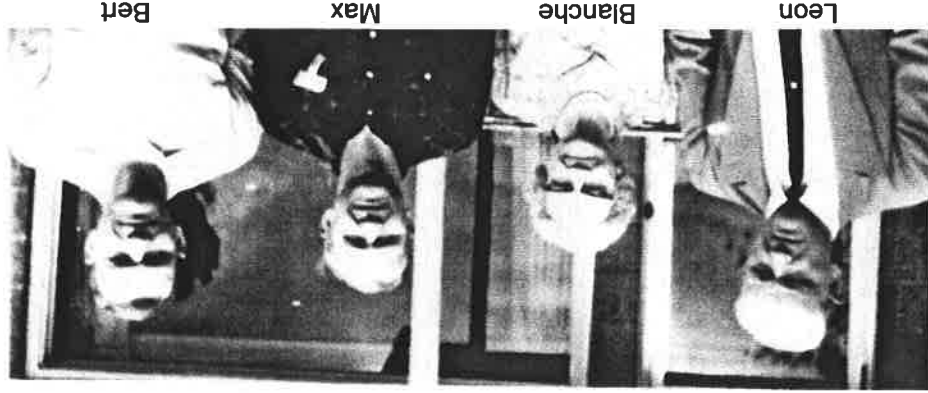
Life here is moving along well and we are being really blessed here with our small branch. I love you all and thank you for your letters.
